3	THE REGISTRAR: This hearing of the Cornwall
4	Public Inquiry is now in session. The Honourable Mr.
5	Justice Normand Glaude, Commissioner, presiding.
6	Please be seated.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Good morning all.
8	Good morning, Mr. Engelmann.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Good morning, Mr.
10	Commissioner.
11	Before we start this morning, Mr. Culic,
12	counsel for Mr. Silmser, wishes to address you.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
14	Mr. Culic.
15	SUBMISSION BY/REPRÉSENTATION PAR MR. CULIC:
16	MR. CULIC: Good morning, Mr. Commissioner.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Good morning, sir.
18	MR. CULIC: I wish I had more pleasant news,
19	but I must advise you that my client, David Silmser, is
20	very agitated today, very fragile today.
21	He does not feel that he can properly retake
22	the stand at this time. We've put into place all the
23	support mechanisms that we can. He still is not feeling
24	capable.
25	He is quite concerned, and knowing him as

well as I do, I share his concern, that if 1 2 he returns to the stand today, he will erupt almost 3 instantly, and it would be disruptive, and probably do far 4 more harm than good to the purposes of this Inquiry. 5 I have explored my own calendar and the only 6 day I have available for the rest of this month is February 7 21st. I understand that we may need more than one day, but 8 that's all that I have available, and I can also advise 9 you, Mr. Commissioner, as I said in my very first letter, the likelihood of David retaking the stand without me being 10 11 present in the courtroom is effectively zero. 12 So we are just going to have to -- with the greatest of respect to you, sir, and to this Commission --13 14 attempt to reschedule his return to the witness stand. 15 MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Commissioner, I can 16 advise you that I know that the witness support staff, here 17 at the Inquiry, has met with Mr. Silmser this morning and concur. I have not seen Mr. Silmser, but he is in quite an 18 19 agitated state. 20 Perhaps what we could do, if it's agreeable 21 to counsel that have not had an opportunity to crossexamine Mr. Silmser to date, perhaps I could ask that they 22 meet with me and Mr. Culic, and we try and find dates that 23

are acceptable to all in the nearest possible future so

that we could hope to finish Mr. Silmser's evidence. That

1	would be, at least, my suggestion.
2	We certainly have witnesses that are
3	available to carry on tomorrow. I don't have them
4	available today, but we have two witnesses that are
5	prepared to proceed tomorrow, and we would have a full day
6	tomorrow.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
8	And what about scheduling February 21st,
9	setting it aside so that Mr. Culic can attend and then we
10	can reassess his client's situation?
11	MR. ENGELMANN: I would just want to confirm
12	with counsel that are earmarked to cross-examine Mr.
13	Silmser because I realize that I believe Mr. Callaghan
14	was next up and, well, perhaps I'll let him speak to that.
15	That is certainly something we could do, but I think he may
16	not be available on that particular date.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Maybe I'll just turn the
19	microphone over then to those counsel who have not yet had
20	an opportunity
21	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: to cross-examine.
23	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
24	Mr. Callaghan.
25	SUBMISSION BY/REPRÉSENTATION PAR MR. CALLAGHAN:

1	MR. CALLAGHAN: Sir, I don't have any
2	position with respect to whether he can or cannot continue.
3	My difficulty is I have scheduled out the month of February
4	because I wasn't anticipating to be here.
5	I'm free on the $28^{\rm th}$ of February and may well
6	be free on the $27^{\rm th}$ on the matter results.
7	I think what we need to do is caucus and
8	figure out a date. I mean, I'm prepared to go now,
9	obviously, but I've obviously invested a lot of time and I
10	would like to be the one that does the examination.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: Fair enough.
12	Anyone else wish to comment?
13	SUBMISSION BY/REPRÉSENTATION PAR MR. NEUBERGER:
14	MR. NEUBERGER: Thank you, Mr. Commissioner.
15	I guess to state the obvious, it's important
16	that we have Mr. Silmser in a position where he feels he
17	can properly give testimony.
18	I am available the week of the $19^{\rm th}$ and the
19	21 st . Because of Mr. Rose's illness the other week, we've
20	certainly played off so we could accommodate dates.
21	It may be, if we caucus, that if we know
22	there is one date secure, the $21^{\rm st}$ when we're sitting, we
23	might want to book it for who can cross-examine
24	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
25	MR. NEUBERGER: and then see if we can

8	I am deeply, deeply saddened that Mr.
9	Silmser is finding it difficult. As much as I can
10	understand and appreciate the courage that it takes to come
11	here and to deal with this, I would like you to extend to
12	him my wish, my heartfelt wish, that he, first of all, gets
13	well as best as he can as soon as he can; that I will be as
14	innovative and creative as I can to ensure that when he
15	comes back that we can accommodate the situation as best we
16	can.
17	I think that's the best I can say at this
18	point.
19	All right.
20	So I take we'll adjourn for the day, meet
21	with counsel, and what I'd like to do tomorrow morning is
22	address the issue of dates, and then we can fix some kind
23	of calendar, and then see how we go.
24	Also, if there is anything we, as an
25	Inquiry, can do for this gentleman, either through

1	counseling or whatever, please, pass that on to him as
2	well.
3	Thank you.
4	MR. CULIC: I should comment again, perhaps
5	on the record, everything I'm most impressed with the
6	support staff and they're absolutely excellent.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
8	All right.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Commissioner, then for
10	tomorrow, we'll address the rescheduling of Mr. Silmser's
11	continuing cross-examination
