3	THE REGISTRAR: This hearing of the Cornwall
4	Public Inquiry is now in session. The Honourable Mr.
5	Justice Normand Glaude, Commissioner, presiding.
6	Please be seated. Veuillez vous asseoir.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Good morning
8	all. Mr. Engelmann.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Good morning, Mr.
10	Commissioner. I believe someone has just gone to get the
11	witness.
12	THE COMMISSIONER: All right, great.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: While we are waiting, I can
14	tell Counsel, I understand we've received the first volume
15	of the Discovery transcript from a lawsuit that Mr. Leroux
16	and others were involved in.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Great, thank you.
18	Good morning, Mr. Leroux. How are you doing
19	today?
20	MR. LEROUX: Oh, I'm burnt, but I'm all
21	right.
22	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry? You are
23	burnt?
24	MR. LEROUX: Burnt, but I'm all right.

MR. ENGELMANN: Good morning, sir.

1	MR. LEROUX: Good morning.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: I just wanted to explain,
3	Mr. Commissioner, that we've received one volume. I hope
4	to be able to disclose it to the parties around the noon
5	hour and another volume later this afternoon.
6	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. Great; thank
7	you. All right
8	Mr. Leroux, if you could bring the
9	microphone down a little bit, just so that you can put it
10	up to your face. There you go. Good, thank you.
11	RON LEROUX, Resumed/Sous le même serment
12	EXAMINATION IN-CHIEF BY/INTERROGATOIRE EN-CHEF PAR MR.
13	PETER ENGELMANN (Cont'd/Suite):
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Leroux, just to remind
15	you, sir, on occasion documents will be on the screen and,
16	of course, you'll have some documents in front of you as
17	well; whatever you find easier to use.
18	MR. LEROUX: Screen.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. And when we use the
20	screen, we will try and blow it up a bit, so it's a bit
21	easier to read.
22	MR. LEROUX: Okay, thank you.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, I understand that
24	during the time that you knew Mr. Seguin so we are
25	talking mid to late '80s, early '90s that you would

1	often have lunch at a restaurant here in the City of
2	Cornwall.
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: What was the name of the
5	restaurant, sir?
6	MR. LEROUX: Harv's Diner.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: And would it be fair for me
8	to describe you as a regular at Harv's?
9	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you regularly have lunch
11	there with others?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Was there a group of you
14	that often dined there?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Can you tell us who else
17	would have been in that group?
18	MR. LEROUX: C-8, Al Laplante,
19	Malcolm MacDonald, Ken Seguin, a couple of guys from an
20	engineering place up on Rosemount his wife owned the M&M
21	Meat Market; Ron Wilson, two or three days a week;
22	sometimes his nephew from the steelworks company.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. Did you mention
24	Malcolm MacDonald? I'm sorry.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, he did.

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay.
3	Any colleagues of Mr. Seguin join you there
4	from time to time?
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes, Van Diepen, a couple of
6	times a week.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
8	MR. LEROUX: Van Diepen; Joss Van Diepen.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes?
10	MR. LEROUX: And a couple of times, a Carol
11	Cardinal.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And this
13	restaurant, was it close to the Probation Office?
14	MR. LEROUX: It was within a block
15	and-a-half.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And that's when
17	the Probation Office was in the same building as Malcolm
18	MacDonald's law office?
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes, upstairs.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, you told us yesterday,
21	on I think more than one occasion about knowledge of
22	phone calls that Mr. Seguin was getting from someone by the
23	name of D.S.?
24	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Just to make sure I got it,

5 least one occasion, maybe more, that you were present when

he would have received a call?

7 MR. LEROUX: Yes.

8 MR. ENGELMANN: And you also overheard

others talking about these calls?

10 MR. LEROUX: Yes.

11 MR. ENGELMANN: And I believe you talked

12 about discussions either that Malcolm had -- Malcolm

13 MacDonald -- with Ken Sequin about these calls, or others?

14 MR. LEROUX: Yes, Charlie knew about them

15 too.

16 MR. ENGELMANN: All right.

THE COMMISSIONER: Well, how do you know 17

18 Charlie knew about them?

19 MR. LEROUX: He was there one night when he

20 got a call.

21 THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.

22 MR. ENGELMANN: All right.

23 MR. LEROUX: So he took the phone upstairs.

24 He had a yelling match, and we were sitting downstairs.

25 And I left after that.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: When you say Charlie, you
2	mean Father Charles MacDonald?
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall approximately
5	when Mr. Seguin would have first told you about receiving a
6	call from Mr. Silmser?
7	MR. LEROUX: Probably let me think it
8	was going on for months; that I know. I'm not going to
9	give you a date, but
10	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And do you
11	recall when the last call was, that you know of?
12	MR. LEROUX: The 24^{th} of November '93.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: So the just before he
14	killed himself?
15	MR. LEROUX: The night before the American
16	Thanksgiving.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Just before he killed
18	himself. Is that correct?
19	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And, so would
21	Mr. Seguin have talked to you about why Mr. Silmser was
22	calling him?
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall what he would
25	have said to you?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes he said, "I molested a
2	kid years ago, and it's catching up with me". Something to
3	that effect. He said, "Now, he wants money".
4	MR. ENGELMANN: And, would he have discussed
5	that with others in your presence?
6	MR. LEROUX: He would usually ask me to
7	leave when Ken and when Malcolm and Charlie arrived,
8	because they were then he'd tell me after, "He's trying
9	to raise some money".
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Raise some money for whom?
11	MR. LEROUX: To give to D.S.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And sir, were
13	you ever present when D.S. or David Silmser was discussed
14	amongst Ken Seguin, Father Charles MacDonald, and
15	Malcolm MacDonald?
16	MR. LEROUX: Not in the same room.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you ever overhear
18	conversations they were having about D.S.?
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: What, if anything, do you
21	remember?
22	MR. LEROUX: "Little scumbag." They
23	mentioned something about he had stolen \$40 from the
24	church, "He's nothing but a thief". They mentioned, "Why
25	didn't he just call the police when he stole the \$40?" He

1	says, "I already did".
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Who already did?
3	MR. LEROUX: Charlie had reported him taking
4	money out of the church.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Did Mr. Seguin
6	ever tell you what Mr. Silmser was calling him about and
7	what he was going to be doing if he didn't get some money?
8	MR. LEROUX: Yes. He would go to police.
9	He would go to his boss, Mr. Robarts Emile Robert,
10	Robert Emile Robert.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: In the months coming up to
12	his death, his suicide, would Mr. Seguin talk to you about
13	Mr. Silmser and the calls?
14	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: What was his state of mind,
16	to your knowledge? Like how did he express himself?
17	MR. LEROUX: His demeanour wasn't very good.
18	He was more like just out of it. He'd get upset. He
19	didn't know where to go. He didn't know so he'd go for
20	a long drive some place and sit in the car and talk, or
21	we'd drive all the way to Montreal, go sit in a sub shop
22	and just have coffee and look out the window, and he'd just
23	ramble on and on and on and on.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: You say he was asking people
25	to help him with money?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Who?
3	MR. LEROUX: Malcolm and Charlie.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Did others seem to be as
5	worried as he was about this, from your knowledge?
6	MR. LEROUX: Others meaning?
7	MR. ENGELMANN: Charlie or Malcolm about
8	this thing with Silmser.
9	MR. LEROUX: Malcolm was starting to slow
10	down a little bit. He was having days where he didn't talk
11	much. I mean, he'd have his head down in there; he wasn't
12	eating all his lunch and towards the end.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, if you could take a
14	look at Exhibit 567, paragraph 24. Just read that over for
15	a minute, sir.
16	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
17	MR. LEROUX: That's true.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
19	MR. LEROUX: That's true. I was standing in
20	the kitchen pouring a tea "Make sure you pour the tea
21	over the bag" he didn't want the bag in the bottom of
22	the teacup, and they were having a discussion in the next
23	room about that.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: About what, sir?
25	MR. LEROUX: About his paranoia; about he

1	worries too much; he'll have it looked after "I got
2	connections." He mentioned a Heidi something, Sebalj or
3	something like that.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Who would have mentioned
5	her?
6	MR. LEROUX: Sebalj, whoever the hell she
7	is. I don't know her.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you know who mentioned
9	her?
10	MR. LEROUX: Malcolm.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
12	You didn't know her?
13	MR. LEROUX: No.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
15	So you actually have a recollection
16	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: of this conversation?
18	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: But the affidavit says "I
20	am privy and present during several conversations."
21	MR. LEROUX: In the house, in the next room.
22	I mean, it's around the corner. There is no doors.
23	There's two large archways, and they're sitting right on
24	the couch in the next room.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Right.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: That word "privy", is that
2	your word or is that someone else's?
3	MR. LEROUX: Privy, I don't what that I
4	don't know what it means.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
6	And just and we'll come to this, but as I
7	understand it, these documents were typed up or written up
8	by either Mr. Dunlop or Mr. Bourgeois, typically?
9	MR. LEROUX: As far as I know. I never saw
10	machines; do it on the second or third floor. He was also
11	working out of a house next door. I don't know.
12	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry; who was
13	working out of the house next door?
14	MR. LEROUX: Mr. Dunlop; he was working out
15	of a house next door.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: You have to speak
17	MR. LEROUX: Oh, he was working out of a
18	house next door on Amelia Street. Whenever I came there he
19	did not want my car to be seen there. He'd park it some
20	place else. One car had Maine State plates. The other car
21	had Ontario plates.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, do you recall an
23	incident where you saw Mr. Seguin walking out onto the
24	river
25	MR. LEROUX: Yes.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: during the winter?
2	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall when that was,
4	sir?
5	MR. LEROUX: Well, it usually doesn't freeze
6	out there until January or February. Within the year of
7	the year he died.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
9	So the winter before he died?
10	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: And do you recall what he
12	was doing?
13	MR. LEROUX: Standing within five feet,
14	looking down into a large hole in the ice where there's
15	about probably 12 or 15 feet of water.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: And how did you find him out
17	there?
18	MR. LEROUX: I saw him through a picture
19	window.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: And did you have a
21	discussion with him about what he was doing out there? How
22	was he dressed?
23	MR. LEROUX: He had a pair of pyjamas on,
24	blue and white plaid, and he had red and black plaid
25	slippers; bedroom slippers. And I'm not sure what he had

1	on. Maybe a T-shirt top or something.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, if you could take a
3	look at Exhibit 562. This is a statement or an interview
4	by Detective Constable McDonell and Fagan.
5	You've talked about this. This is an
6	interview they have with you in Norway, Maine, March 28^{th} ,
7	1994. So about three months after Mr. Seguin's death. And
8	pretty specific here, it says:
9	"In December '92 around the $19^{\rm th}$ of the
10	month I was getting up, looked out the
11	window and saw Ken Seguin walking out
12	on the ice in his pyjamas."
13	Did you see Mr. Seguin out on the ice in his
14	pyjamas on more than one occasion or just on one occasion?
15	MR. LEROUX: Just one occasion.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Then on the following page,
17	sir, of that exhibit you say, in the second paragraph, you
18	made reservations for the $23^{\rm rd}$ or $24^{\rm th}$ of December '92 to
19	stay it says "Salt AM Motel". Is that the Salt Air
20	Motel?
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes, I called Bill; I told him
22	we'd be down within 28 hours; 30 hours.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: And it says:
24	"A night or two before we left for
25	Florida I went over to see him and he

1	was all bunched up, fell to the floor.
2	I thought he was having a convulsion or
3	something."
4	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall an incident
6	shortly after the incident on the ice where you saw
7	Mr. Seguin like this?
8	MR. LEROUX: Yes, well there was several
9	times that this happened. Every night after supper, I'd
10	walk over, or my wife and I would walk over and we'd talk
11	with him. It kind of straightened out when she was there;
12	I mean he'd pull out of it.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: So did you take him to
14	Florida around Christmas time of 1992?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you know for how long you
17	were down there with him?
18	MR. LEROUX: Close to a month.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: And when you came back from
20	Florida sir, did you stay in Summerstown, or did you go
21	somewhere else?
22	MR. LEROUX: No.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: What did you do?
24	MR. LEROUX: I gave him the responsibility
25	of a five or six year old Rottweiler, the key to the house

1	and I said "I'm going to go back; I can't take this
2	weather" like it was minus 44 degrees, it was wicked
3	cold.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: So you went back to Florida?
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes, and I asked him "Are you
6	going to be all right?" and he said "Yes, I'm fine. I've
7	had a good rest. I'm going to go back to work, and I'm
8	going to relax. I'll be all right. And I'll look after
9	the dog. Don't worry about the dog. Don't worry about
10	anything".
11	MR. ENGELMANN: So you're referring to
12	Mr. Seguin who's
13	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: going to look after your
15	dog and your house?
16	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you, in fact, go back to
18	Florida?
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes, I drove right straight
20	through; just gas and go.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: And sir, on your way home
22	from Florida, did you come right back to Cornwall?
23	MR. LEROUX: No.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Where did you go?
25	MR. LEROUX: I drove. I was thinking about

1	you're right on cue here Denis Bolland back to
2	Boston, Massachusetts to turn himself in for an armed
3	robbery cause Carol, his mother, asked me to because the
4	Fort Lauderdale police were close to him. They were going
5	to bust him. That they extradite him; he would probably
6	get 10 years. So she said, if you would drive him back
7	he's just a person I had met a woman that I had met in
8	Florida her son.
9	And the other one was Jeremy Thompson who
10	was wanted in Maine for a school robbery smashing some
11	computers and stuff in the school, and he went to the
12	Oxford County Sheriff's Department and turned himself in.
13	Then I met my wife that morning.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Well, that's
15	what I was going to ask you about.
16	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: I understand you met your
18	wife in Maine.
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: And that you stayed there
21	for a while.
22	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, a couple of weeks
23	probably.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you remember when you got
25	back to Cornwall in the spring of 1993?

1	MR. LEROUX: I'm not sure. I was on another
2	trip. I was in love.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. When you got
4	back to Cornwall in the spring of 1993
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes?
6	MR. ENGELMANN: can you tell us what
7	happened when you arrived at your home?
8	MR. LEROUX: Oh, the place was like a bomb
9	went off in there. Stuff was strewed all over the place;
10	the whole place was trashed.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: What do you mean it was
12	trashed?
13	MR. LEROUX: Everything was gone through.
14	Stuff was moved, cupboard doors were left opened; place was
15	a mess.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: It wasn't the way you left
17	it?
18	MR. LEROUX: No.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Can you tell us
20	anything else about what happened shortly after you
21	arrived?
22	MR. LEROUX: Not sure whether the police
23	called first or Ken called first, but I went over to talk
24	to Ken no, he called me; he called me. And he said "I
25	got you in a lot of trouble". He said "I hid some tapes

1	over there; a brown suitcase full of tapes upstairs". And
2	he said the police were there and searched and found them,
3	and something about a gun. I'm not sure whether he told me
4	that or the police told me that when I got there, I'm not
5	sure.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Well, let me ask you this,
7	did you you say you got a phone call from Mr. Seguin.
8	He says he left got you in some trouble. Did you also
9	get a phone call from the police?
10	MR. LEROUX: I could have.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Telling you that they had
12	searched your house?
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: So did so Mr. Seguin said
15	he left something in your house?
16	MR. LEROUX: He had to get those tapes back.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
18	MR. LEROUX: He had to get the tapes back.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Why did he have to get the
20	tapes back?
21	MR. LEROUX: He wanted them back. He said
22	something about they were going to destroy reputation or
23	reputations.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: So he wanted to get the
25	tapes back that were in the briefcase, that he had left in

1	your house?
2	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: And he told you the police
4	had taken that away?
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: And did you attend at the
7	local police station?
8	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: And where would your local
10	police station have been?
11	MR. LEROUX: Lancaster; just out of the
12	village, they come back west of it.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So it's the OPP
14	Detachment in Lancaster?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And did you, in
17	fact, attend there that day or the next day?
18	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: And
20	MR. LEROUX: About mid-afternoon.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: And you have some
22	recollection as to what took place at the police station
23	when you attended?
24	MR. LEROUX: Well, some of it is foggy. But
25	I was desperate to get those tapes back. I kept saying

1	they weren't mine.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
3	MR. LEROUX: He asked me first off, he
4	asked me something about if I'm left-handed or not. I said
5	"No, I am right-handed".
6	Then he said "Those tapes don't belong to
7	you". I said I found them in a dumpster and I want them
8	back and I'll sign for them.
9	"But they're not yours."
10	MR. ENGELMANN: This is the police officer
11	talking to you?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes, a big fellow. I don't
13	know what a Tim or I'm not sure of the name.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you, in fact, leave the
15	police station with a briefcase and videotapes?
16	MR. LEROUX: No.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Were you asked to sign a
18	document about that?
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes, I thought I was signing a
20	release document to get them. But I was actually signing -
21	- I don't know what it was, but he said "We're going to
22	destroy them, we'll do it". So I said "Well".
23	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
24	MR. LEROUX: He said, "We'll destroy them".
25	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.

1	MR. LEROUX: "We will."
2	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
3	MR. LEROUX: He took them down. He put them
4	on the floor behind the desk.
5	And then, there was something about a
6	weapon; I'm not sure whether they did it that day. The
7	weapon they found in the closet I was a gun collector
8	anyway. I had 31 handguns.
9	But this was a gun that was found by a
10	neighbour in the bottom of the river and it had been in
11	that closet for years. I mean you couldn't even fire it.
12	It was just a piece of junk, rusty; could have done more
13	damage with a brick.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: So the police seized that
15	gun?
16	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: And they had seized a
18	briefcase with some videotapes?
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: And did you actually see the
21	briefcase and/or the videotapes at the police station?
22	MR. LEROUX: Just the briefcase with a
23	little lock on it.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: So you never saw videotapes
25	at all?

1	MR. LEROUX: No.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Who told you there were
3	videotapes in the briefcase?
4	MR. LEROUX: There was two tapes sitting
5	beside the briefcase.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: At the police station?
7	MR. LEROUX: Oh, yeah.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And had anybody
9	told you about other videotapes aside from those two
10	videotapes?
11	MR. LEROUX: No.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So when Ken
13	Seguin told you that there were videotapes in the
14	briefcase, did he tell you that there were two videotapes?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
17	MR. LEROUX: Two other ones? Oh, no; he
18	didn't say anything about it. He just wanted the briefcase
19	back.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So I'm a bit
21	confused.
22	MR. LEROUX: Well, it was two tapes that
23	weren't in the case. The case was locked. There was two
24	tapes sitting beside it on the counter.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Did anybody tell

1	you there were other videotapes in the briefcase?
2	MR. LEROUX: Police officer, that's about
3	it, and Ken.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Did they give you a sense as
5	to how many videotapes were in the briefcase?
6	MR. LEROUX: No.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: So did you have a further
8	discussion with Mr. Seguin about this when you returned to
9	your residence?
10	MR. LEROUX: Yeah; he was damned upset.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Why is that?
12	MR. LEROUX: Because I didn't bring them
13	back. He says "You didn't tell them they were mine?" I
14	says "You told me not to, so I didn't". "So where did you
15	tell them you got them?" And I told him, I made up a story
16	that I found them in a dumpster.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: So was Mr. Seguin content
18	with that?
19	MR. LEROUX: No.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Why not?
21	MR. LEROUX: He worried.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Why was he worried about the
23	videotapes?
24	MR. LEROUX: Because maybe some I'm not
25	even going to say maybe; I'm not going to speculate there.

left?

1	He just wanted them back. He was just desperate to get
2	them back for some reason.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he tell you why he
4	wanted them back?
5	MR. LEROUX: He said he would get
6	something about his reputation and other people's
7	reputations, and
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he ever tell you what
9	was on the videotapes?
10	MR. LEROUX: No.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Now, sir, you said the house
12	was different your house was different than when you
13	left. Was there anything else that you discovered at your
14	home either that day or the next day?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes, there was a large wall
16	unit. It was made out of oak, and it had probably 15 or 20
17	handguns in it, or a dozen handguns I'm not sure; and it
18	was gone.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay, so you were missing
20	some weapons?
21	MR. LEROUX: All of them. All that were
22	left.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Was there anything new at
24	your house? Something that hadn't been there when you

1	MR. LEROUX: Now, my mind is going blank.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Can you help him out a
3	little bit?
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you find anything in a
5	laundry basket or
6	MR. LEROUX: Oh, my God, yes. There was a
7	45-gallon barrel I used for a laundry hamper, and I emptied
8	it before I went to Florida dirty clothes. I washed
9	them downstairs in the laundry room, and I remember the
10	barrel being empty. You don't leave dirty clothes and go
11	away for long periods of time.
12	So and I had only been back for a day, so
13	there wouldn't be anything in it. So I really didn't look
14	in it until the next morning when I got up, and I went to
15	throw clothes in there, and I looked in it and there's a
16	large pile of tape from videotapes. Half the barrel was
17	full of it and some documents that were ripped up.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: You are making some gesture
19	with your hands.
20	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: What about the tapes?
22	MR. LEROUX: Because it jogs my memory about
23	what I what about
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you remember about these
25	tapes?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, they were all pulled out
2	of the they were all taken apart. Like they when you
3	pull a tape out of a machine and it all goes out like
4	spaghetti all over the place.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes?
6	MR. LEROUX: Well, they were like shredded -
7	- like you'd pulled them all out.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: What kind of tapes are you
9	talking about? Are these cassette tapes or videotapes?
10	MR. LEROUX: VCR tapes.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: VCR?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. You say there were
14	some documents that were ripped up?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Could you
17	MR. LEROUX: Corrections and Parole
18	documents because they had the insignia and I pieced
19	together some of the pieces and it said something about a
20	permission to have Gerry Renshaw live with him at his
21	residence. He had to get permission to I had asked him
22	about it, he explained to me he had to get permission
23	through
24	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So after you
25	found these tapes that had been pulled out of cartridges

1	and some documents from Corrections, did you discuss that
2	with Mr. Seguin?
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes. You know, he left in the
4	morning to go back to work. So I hit him at noon; at
5	lunchtime.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: And where did you see him at
7	noon?
8	MR. LEROUX: I came in to the diner at about
9	11:30 or a quarter to twelve.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you have a discussion
11	with him about what you had found at your home that
12	morning?
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall the
15	discussion?
16	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Can you tell us about it?
18	MR. LEROUX: He said, "I'll be over there as
19	soon as I get home, and I'll clean the barrel out." And he
20	did.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he tell you who put that
22	material in the barrel?
23	MR. LEROUX: He did.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he explain to you why he
25	pulled tape out of some tapes and apparently not out of

1	others?
2	MR. LEROUX: Because yeah, they weren't
3	packed, they weren't locked into anything. They weren't
4	locked in a box, they were just apparently he said he
5	had a bunch of loose tapes that he carried over with the
6	and he would pull them apart. Apparently, he missed two
7	because, apparently, somebody said they found two in a
8	bathtub, I see it somewhere in the paperwork, but I didn't
9	say that. I didn't
10	MR. ENGELMANN: I guess what I don't
11	understand, Mr. Leroux
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: is did he tell you why
14	he destroyed some tapes and not others?
15	MR. LEROUX: I don't know. Maybe he couldn't find the key
16	for the briefcase. I don't know (laughter/rires).
17	MR. ENGELMANN: You don't know?
18	MR. LEROUX: I don't know.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: You mentioned Gerry Renshaw.
20	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: And permission for him to
22	live with Mr. Seguin. Did you just find that out then or
23	had you known that earlier?
24	MR. LEROUX: Oh, no. He was living there,
25	he was I think he had probably already moved out by

1	then. He was not there.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: So did you know about
3	MR. LEROUX: Oh, he was gone.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: the permission issue at
5	the time Mr. Renshaw was there at the house? Do you
6	understand my question?
7	MR. LEROUX: No, no I didn't know that. I
8	didn't know that until I saw that trashed in the barrel.
9	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Can we just take a brief
11	look at Exhibit 567 again.
12	THE COMMISSIONER: This is the affidavit of
13	your affidavit that you gave
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Dated November 13 th , '96.
15	MR. LEROUX: Right.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: There is some discussion
17	about this issue in paragraphs 20 and 21. Look at
18	paragraph 21, sir. You say:
19	"A few hours after returning from the
20	OPP station, tended Ken's house to ask
21	him what was going on because he had
22	agreed to take care of my home during
23	my trip. Ken Seguin was also supposed
24	to look after my dog. I was infuriated
25	and asked him about this suitcase. Ken

1	Seguin admitted it was his suitcase;
2	that it contained personal pornographic
3	tapes with his handwriting on them."
4	Sir, you've told us a few minutes ago, you
5	weren't sure what was on the tapes.
6	MR. LEROUX: You asked me if I'd seen the
7	tapes in the suitcase.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry. Okay. Yes.
9	All right. Did he ever tell you, sir, that
10	the videotapes contained personal pornographic material?
11	Did he actually ever tell you?
12	MR. LEROUX: No, he didn't use those words.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And then it says
14	here:
15	"Ken also stated it was his tape
16	collection from over the years and that
17	he wanted them out of his house."
18	Did he ever say words to you to that effect?
19	MR. LEROUX: No, the words were "I was
20	worried that the police were going to find these this
21	suitcase and these tapes in my home, so I put it in your
22	home, because you were not there."
23	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. The next
24	sentence says:
25	"He said that he was under

1	investigation for a sexual assault and
2	that these tapes would "clinch" a
3	conviction against him."
4	MR. LEROUX: Well, he'd be telling me for an
5	entire year that every time he saw the police come into the
6	Parole office or a police officer go slow by his home, he
7	thought they were going to come in and arrest him.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he tell you why they
9	were going to come in and arrest him, or why he was worried
10	that they were going to do that?
11	MR. LEROUX: Yes, the D.S. thing is part of
12	it and
13	MR. ENGELMANN: What was the other part of
14	it, or did he tell you?
15	MR. LEROUX: Well, some of his traffic, I
16	guess. Some of the people going coming to and from his
17	house.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: But did he ever use words
19	like this? "Under investigation for sexual assault and
20	that these tapes"
21	MR. LEROUX: No, no, no, no, no, no, no.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Where do these words come
23	from, Mr. Leroux?
24	MR. LEROUX: I have no idea. And this word
25	"clinch".

1	MR. ENGELMANN: Is that your word?
2	MR. LEROUX: No.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: So, there were tapes. He
4	was upset about it. He was also concerned about the
5	police, and he was telling you he was concerned about the
6	police, but you didn't use words like, "the tapes would
7	clinch a conviction against him"? Those aren't your words?
8	MR. LEROUX: No.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Now, sir, as a result of the
10	police search of your home, were you, in fact, charged with
11	a criminal offence?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes, I got a fine or something.
13	Malcolm looked after that.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you know what the offence
15	was?
16	MR. LEROUX: I think an unregistered weapon.
17	I should have thought on the safekeeping, but that was not
18	in there. But something about selling a weapon to someone
19	without a FAC, firearms acquisition certificate which I
20	would never sell a firearm to anyone without an acquisition
21	certificate; and also they would have to get a permit to
22	convey.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. My understanding
24	is this is unlawful possession of a restricted weapon
25	MR. LEROUX: Yes.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: and also delivery of a
2	firearm to a person without a certificate?
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Now, did you realize did
5	you know, sir, that those were criminal offences?
6	MR. LEROUX: No.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: What did you think they
8	were?
9	MR. LEROUX: Well, I got a fine. I figured
10	it was just a misdemeanour. I just See I was living in
11	a gun state; I started to live in a gun state. You could
12	carry a gun there.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: You're talking about Maine.
14	MR. LEROUX: Maine. They don't look at
15	that. That's a you can carry your gun around in your
16	car, on your hip, as long as it's showing, as long as the
17	clip is in your pocket.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Who handled this these
19	charges for you? Did you have a lawyer?
20	MR. LEROUX: Malcolm took it.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Did you plead
22	guilty to something, sir, and pay a fine?
23	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, he did for me. I don't
24	think I I don't actually remember being in a courtroom
25	for that.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
2	MR. LEROUX: He looked after it.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall if that was
4	for unlawful possession of a weapon?
5	MR. LEROUX: Probably; probably.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Let's talk about the night
7	before or the night of Mr. Seguin's suicide, November $24^{\rm th}$,
8	1993.
9	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you see him that
11	evening?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: And where did you see him,
14	and when?
15	MR. LEROUX: He walked over to the house and
16	he wanted to go for a coffee. And I asked my wife if she
17	wanted to come. She was no, she wasn't feeling good.
18	She's my wife is a heavy duty diabetic, she takes two
19	needles a day, and she didn't want to go out. She was just
20	
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Where did you go?
22	MR. LEROUX: We were on our way to pick up
23	Doug and then when he got on to Old Orchard, he says "Oh,
24	let's just go over to Gerry's. I want to go to Gerry's".
25	And Gerry lived on with Cara, on Marlborough Street

1	Marlborough Street, in a row some row apartments.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. So who did you visit
3	that night then?
4	MR. LEROUX: Gerry; a little guy, Kevin; and
5	two of their other children by someone else and
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Who were the adults that
7	were present sir?
8	MR. LEROUX: Cara, Barry, Gerry and a couple
9	of his children or one of his children.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So you and
11	Mr. Seguin visited with Gerry Renshaw and his girlfriend?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: And for approximately how
14	long were you there?
15	MR. LEROUX: I remember 9:30, he wanted to
16	go. But what he did he picked up all the cups and he
17	washed them in the sink and he put them on a rack, upside
18	down.
19	I found that odd. I mean you go visit
20	somebody, you have a coffee and you leave it and you go.
21	But no, he but he was a neat he was a neat person.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: When did you get home sir?
23	MR. LEROUX: Approximately five to 10;
24	10 o'clock.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: And did you continue to have

1	a discussion with Mr. Seguin at that hour?
2	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, we stood out on the front
3	lawn. First, I looked over and I saw the lights were all
4	out. I figured my wife had gone to bed, so I talked a
5	while.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall what you were
7	talking about?
8	MR. LEROUX: We're looking up in the sky and
9	he said, "What a beautiful night", I mean this is and
10	talked about Gerry; talked about fishing. We talked about
11	different things.
12	Then his phone rang, between 10 and 10:15;
13	the phone was ringing. And I said, "Don't answer that". I
14	say "You know what that's all don't answer it; just stay
15	let it ring". He said, "No, no. I got to answer that".
16	I went in, and a yelling match there was a yelling match
17	that started.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: A yelling match between
19	whom?
20	MR. LEROUX: He was yelling "David"
21	David. Then he I went to the door, and I was going to
22	say grab the phone from him or something but no, he was
23	standing inside the screen door, and he says "I'll see it
24	tomorrow".
25	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Let me just stop

1	you.
2	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: You weren't involved in a
4	yelling match?
5	MR. LEROUX: Oh, no, no, no, no.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: The yelling match was
7	between Mr. Seguin and someone who had called him?
8	MR. LEROUX: Yes, David Silmser.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, how do you know
10	that, that it was Silmser?
11	MR. LEROUX: David. He told me. He had his
12	hand over the phone. I said "Just hang the damn phone up"
13	He says "No, I have to talk to him; it's David".
14	MR. ENGELMANN: He said it was David; he
15	didn't say it was David Silmser, but you believed it was?
16	MR. LEROUX: I knew it was. Because this
17	was a regular thing; he'd call about 10:00, 11:00; 10:00,
18	11:00; it was always like late at night.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: So he told you to go home
20	and he'd see you the next day?
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes, he was coming over for
22	American Thanksgiving that my mother well my wife was
23	couldn't make And he said he'd be there around 3:15
24	because he wasn't going to work that day; he was going out
25	for a root canal in the morning.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So he tells you
2	he is going to the dentist in the morning and he is coming
3	to your house mid-afternoon for American Thanksgiving?
4	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: So what happens on the 25^{th} ,
6	sir, that you remember; November 25 th American
7	Thanksgiving that year?
8	MR. LEROUX: I leave approximately 8,
9	between 8 and 9. I'm backing out and I look and I see the
10	car there. I say "Gee, he is usually gone by 7:15, 7:30.
11	Oh, the root canal". So I say, "That's fine; he's going to
12	go for a root canal; he's not going to work today".
13	So I went to town; I got back about 3
14	o'clock; roughly 3; 5 to 3, 10 to 3. I park the car in
15	front of the garage. I walk to the house.
16	My wife came out and she says "There is
17	something going on over there. There's been numerous cars
18	coming and going. Police were there. Corrections and
19	government cars" she said. Had a number on them, or
20	something. Anyway
21	MR. ENGELMANN: So she told you there had
22	been a police car or cars and a Corrections or government
23	car?
24	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Did they talk to her? Did

1	she just observe them? Or do you remember what she said?
2	MR. LEROUX: Just stood there and observed.
3	They knocked at the back door; the front door; back door;
4	front door; trying to look in, she said. And then they all
5	left.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: What did you and your wife
7	do then?
8	MR. LEROUX: We went into the house back
9	to my house, I said "Well". I'm thinking maybe he just
10	didn't want to answer the door, or maybe he is not feeling
11	good, or maybe the root canal and he took some pills to
12	sleep, or
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you knock on his door?
14	MR. LEROUX: No. I went over with my wife
15	and there was a neighbour standing at the back of the house
16	of his house Fern Touchette.
17	And I says, "Is Ken around? Is he out on
18	the river? Where is he?" He says, "I don't have no idea".
19	He says, "Lot of activity here today". That's all he said.
20	"People coming; people going". He says, "I don't know
21	where he is".
22	MR. ENGELMANN: So did you knock on his door
23	at some point?
24	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Or did you try and get into

1	his house?
2	MR. LEROUX: I knocked at the back door, on
3	the metal aluminium door on the porch. And nothing, the
4	blinds were all closed.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir did you at some point
6	get a spare key to his house and enter his home?
7	MR. LEROUX: Yes, he used to keep one under
8	the step, on a little nail. But it was not there. So I
9	because Gerry had taken the key; he didn't give it back, I
10	remember. Because one time, he went out fishing and got
11	locked out, and he had to crawl into a window. So anyway,
12	I said to Fern, I said "Can you do you know where they
13	keep another key?" He said, "Yeah, yeah".
14	He says "Go to the end of the porch" he
15	had like a dog kennel at the end of the porch, and
16	underneath the porch 2x10's there's a nail with a key on
17	it.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
19	MR. LEROUX: My wife went in there and she
20	got it; she found it.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: So, you got a key.
22	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: And did you go into his
24	home?
25	MR. LEROUX: Yes.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
2	And who went into the home?
3	MR. LEROUX: My wife went in.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
5	MR. LEROUX: I followed her.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
7	And what did you find when you went into the
8	home? What did you see?
9	MR. LEROUX: Nothing was out of place. I
10	called, and I said "I guess he's just not here."
11	Then I glanced over and I saw blood spots
12	across the kitchen table. Then I noticed the laundry room
13	door open on the back of the kitchen was slightly open.
14	I looked at her, I says "I think he's
15	upstairs." So she was in front of me. I walked up one
16	approximately four or five steps and I saw the body
17	hanging on the door. Anyway, it was charcoal grey, and he
18	was slumped over. And
19	MR. ENGELMANN: So he was hanging, sir, and
20	he was dead?
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes. When I keeled over
22	backwards I hit the kitchen floor. My wife left
23	immediately; went back over to my home to get nitro
24	tablets.

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MR. ENGELMANN: You had or have a heart

1	condition, sir?
2	MR. LEROUX: Had. I worked it out.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
4	MR. LEROUX: It's I think anyway.
5	Anyway, I popped I don't know, one or two
6	of them.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, do you remember what
8	did you or your wife try and call someone then?
9	MR. LEROUX: No, not yet.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Not yet?
11	MR. LEROUX: No.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: What did you do?
13	MR. LEROUX: She went upstairs. And I
14	started up behind her, and I had to use the banister so I
15	looked at it, but I didn't touch it because it was just
16	covered with blood.
17	Anyways, she walked into the bathroom and
18	she's standing there looking right at him. She said "He's
19	gone." She said "The shower curtain is broke; there's
20	blood all over the floor; there's a knife, and some kind of
21	a saw here."
22	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
23	Sir,
24	MR. LEROUX: Sorry, Doug. God.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Doug is his brother, right?

1	All right.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, we can pass over
3	that.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes.
5	Sir, did you or your wife try and call
6	someone after you found Mr. Seguin's body?
7	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: What did you
9	MR. LEROUX: I was out of my mind. I got a
10	book out of the glove box out of the end table of the
11	couch they had two end tables there and I leafed
12	through it and had my wife dial the number; and I left a
13	lengthy message on his tape, because he was not answering
14	the phone
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Who, sir?
16	MR. LEROUX: at the Parish centre.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Who were you trying to call?
18	MR. LEROUX: I'm trying to call Charlie.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Why were you calling
20	Charles MacDonald?
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Why were you calling him?
23	Why were you trying to call him?
24	MR. LEROUX: Give him sh to
25	MR. ENGELMANN: To give him what?

1	MR. LEROUX: To give him shit.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Why?
3	MR. LEROUX: Because he should have been
4	looking after this; this guy here. I mean, he
5	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm not sure I understand.
6	You're calling
7	MR. LEROUX: Monetarily wise. If they would
8	have come up with the money faster, sooner I think they
9	raised something like \$15,000. Ken said that's all they
10	could raise, \$15,000. And he was going to have the money
11	by Thursday or Friday, but apparently the money was late.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: Why were you blaming Father
13	Charles MacDonald for this?
14	MR. LEROUX: Because he came up with \$32,000
15	from Rocky, and he Ken needed \$100,000.
16	Malcolm would have been the next call, but
17	no She says "We have to call the police." I said "I
18	don't call the police. You call them." She called 911,
19	and it seemed like forever when you're on a death house. I
20	just wanted to get out of there.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: So your wife called the
22	police?
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
25	Let me just ask you this, sir. Could the

1	witness be shown document number 715763? It's right on the
2	top.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: And what is this,
4	Mr. Engelmann?
5	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm just going to ask the
6	witness to identify the document.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
8	Exhibit 575.

11	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Leroux, just looking at
12	the front cover here, and if you would look at some of the

16	THE COMMISSIONER: Madam Clerk, could you
17	which number is that? On the top right or top left?
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Top left. Bates page.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Seven-o-five-eight-six-
20	one-two (7058612). Have you found that, sir?
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Seven-o-five-eight-six-zero-
22	two (7058602).
23	THE COMMISSIONER: Zero-two. Okay.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Seven-zero-five-eight-six-
25	zero-two.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: The numbers are on the
2	left side, sir; closer to where the staple is.
3	MR. LEROUX: Seven-zero-five

11	There we go. All right. So does this help
12	you identify what the document is?
13	MR. LEROUX: Oh, definitely. That's his
14	book. That's this a photostat copy of the book that I
15	had in my hand.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Whose book, sir?
17	MR. LEROUX: Ken Seguin's; the one I took
18	out of the drawer.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: You took it out of the
20	drawer for what purpose?
21	MR. LEROUX: To call Father Charles
22	MacDonald.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
24	So you didn't know his number? You didn't
25	know his home number off by heart?

1	MR. LEROUX: No.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: So you looked in
3	Mr. Seguin's address book?
4	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
6	And what we're looking at is a photocopy of
7	that book. Is that correct?
8	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: And did you actually speak
10	to Father Charles MacDonald, or did you leave him a
11	message?
12	MR. LEROUX: I left him a message.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: And do you recall the
14	content of the message, sir?
15	MR. LEROUX: No, but I was mad, and I said a
16	lot of things. I was losing it. I don't remember.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he ever call you back?
18	MR. LEROUX: No.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Ever?
20	MR. LEROUX: No.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you ever speak to him
22	about this afterwards?
23	MR. LEROUX: Only saw him again one more
24	time after that.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Tell us about that. When

1	did you see him?
2	MR. LEROUX: Actually twice.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
4	MR. LEROUX: Once was from a distance.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay, but you didn't have
6	any further contact with him after this?
7	MR. LEROUX: Absolutely none.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: So what did you do with this
9	phone book, sir? This personal phone book of Mr. Seguin's
10	after you called Father MacDonald?
11	MR. LEROUX: I took it.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: Why did you take it?
13	MR. LEROUX: Well, I took it I didn't
14	know what I was going to do with it. Just didn't want it
15	to be there. I mean I don't know, I just took it.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Why?
17	MR. LEROUX: I figured maybe they'd
18	investigate, pick up some names out of there and make
19	trouble through some people. I didn't know.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Well, were you worried about
21	them making trouble for you, sir? Someone else?
22	MR. LEROUX: No, I just wanted to get the
23	book out of there.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: What did you do with it?
25	MR. LEROUX: I kept it for a couple of days.

1	Then I got thinking about it, and I said, "Oh Jesus, what
	Titell I got chilining about It, and I bara, on tests, what
2	•••"
3	I thought about destroying it, and I said,
4	"No". Anyway, I got a hold of Gerry Renshaw to give it to
5	him. I said, "See that Doug gets that". I told him to
6	give it to Doug.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you know if Mr. Renshaw
8	gave it to Doug?

9 MR. LEROUX: I don't know. I have no idea.

10 MR. ENGELMANN: Were you familiar with some

of the names in this book?

MR. LEROUX: Yes.

13 MR. ENGELMANN: And did you know some of the
14 names to be either probationers or former probationers of
15 Mr. Seguin?

MR. LEROUX: Yes.

MR. ENGELMANN: By the way, sir, this should have a "P" for -- sorry, publication ban with respect to C
8.

THE COMMISSIONER: That's right.

MR. ENGELMANN: There were a number of
documents yesterday as well, and I'll give you a list right
after the morning break, if I can.

24 **THE COMMISSIONER:** Thank you.

MR. ENGELMANN: Oh, 575, I'm sorry.

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1	I just jumped 200 exhibits. So 575, I
2	apologize.
3	Now sir, do you recall the police arriving
4	at Mr. Seguin's?
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And did you have
7	a conversation with an officer Dussault of the Ontario
8	Provincial Police?
9	MR. LEROUX: If that was his name, yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: You don't remember that
11	name?
12	MR. LEROUX: No.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you remember
14	MR. LEROUX: I don't remember a lot that
15	happened in that space of time, right there, right then.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. Let me ask you this.
17	Do you remember if you spoke to one police officer the day
18	of his death, the day you found the body, or did you speak
19	to two officers that day?
20	MR. LEROUX: There was one that came racing
21	in to the front yard when my wife and I were leaving.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
23	MR. LEROUX: There was a police officer
24	named Randy Millar.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay, so you spoke to

1	Officer Millar?
2	MR. LEROUX: Yeah. He wanted a statement.
3	I told him I gave a statement inside.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay, so you had already
5	given a statement to one officer?
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: And then another officer
8	arrived and asked for a statement?
9	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Let's just go to
11	the first one first. Exhibit 561 please.
12	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, is that your signature
14	at the bottom of the page?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: You would agree with me
17	that's a fairly short note here? Correct?
18	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: You talked to the officer
20	about being with Ken the night before? Correct?
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: About being with or going
23	to Cara and Gerry's house?
24	MR. LEROUX: Yes.

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MR. ENGELMANN: You don't say anything about

1	the phone call from David?
2	MR. LEROUX: No.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Why not?
4	MR. LEROUX: I Wouldn't.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Why would you not?
6	MR. LEROUX: Because I told him I wouldn't.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: You told who you wouldn't?
8	MR. LEROUX: In confidence, I told him I
9	wouldn't tell anything about the problem. He trusted me.
10	We talked together, went places together. I didn't want to
11	betray his trust
12	MR. ENGELMANN: When did you first
13	MR. LEROUX: even though he was gone.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Even when he was gone, you
15	didn't want to betray Mr. Seguin's trust?
16	MR. LEROUX: No. That's correct.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: You eventually did open up
18	about some of the things he told you
19	MR. LEROUX: Oh yes. Yes.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: But you didn't the day of
21	his death?
22	MR. LEROUX: No.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: So after you had a brief
24	meeting with Officer Dussault, you had another meeting with
25	an officer Millar?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: What do you remember of that
3	meeting?
4	MR. LEROUX: Only rough get in the car, I
5	want to talk to you. I want a statement.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: He asked you to get in his
7	car?
8	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: I told my wife to get into
10	the back seat.
11	MR. LEROUX: He said, "No, I don't want her
12	in here".
13	And I didn't tell him a whole lot of things
14	either. I mean I wasn't in there long. I doubt if it was
15	five or 10 minutes at the most. But he said, "It's going
16	to go like this. You and Ken were lovers. You got
17	married, and he killed himself." That's when I kicked open
18	the car door, and he said, "Get the hell out of the car."
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Was this at the end
20	MR. LEROUX: He says, "I'll" and then
21	when I said, "Yeah?", and he said, "I'll deny the whole
22	thing". He just kind of shrugged it off. "I'll deny the
23	whole thing". It's you or me (laughter/rire).
24	MR. ENGELMANN: So he asked you if you and
25	Ken were lovers?

1	MR. LEROUX: No, he didn't ask me. He told
2	me. It's going to go like this. It's going to go like
3	this. He started to jot some notes down; and it's not
4	going to go like that.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Might he have said do you
6	think maybe Ken was in love with you and was depressed
7	because you got married and now you're going to Maine?
8	MR. LEROUX: I had already been to Maine
9	lots of times. He sent me a beautiful wedding gift. I
10	mean he's a good guy. He wasn't why should he have any
11	animosity towards that? I had nothing sexually to do with
12	him I would never We were friends.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you have some sense as to
14	how long that meeting was in Officer Millar's car?
15	MR. LEROUX: Not long. My diabetic wife
16	cannot stand for long periods of time anywhere. Supper
17	she has to eat. It's why we usually eat early. You're not
18	going to stand out there for an hour.
19	Excuse me. I want to ask you something.
20	This this statement here, this little just not much
21	more than a paragraph, where is the rest of it?
22	THE COMMISSIONER: No, this
23	MR. ENGELMANN: That's what the officer's
24	taken down. There is some officer's notes from Officer
25	Millar.

1	MR. LEROUX: Well, there would be more than
2	this.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: No, but that's not
4	Millar's
5	MR. LEROUX: No, no, I know this is not
6	Millar's. The first officer, he got there's more than
7	this.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Those are his notes, sir.
9	MR. LEROUX: But there's more than this.
10	Because the original was brought down for me in Maine and
11	it was like three-quarters of a page. I mean, it was
12	and it was who brought that down Chris McDonell.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. You met with Officer
14	McDonell and Officer Fagan at the end of March of '94.
15	MR. LEROUX: That's correct, at 17 Pleasant
16	Street.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And what I've
18	shown you is
19	MR. LEROUX: But there was more than that on
20	that document, on that I'm positive. It's not that
21	little bit of nothing here.
22	Did my wife give a statement? Do you have a
23	statement?
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, there may have been
25	what's called a synopsis prepared.

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Something that's typed up by
3	police officers after interviews.
4	MR. LEROUX: Oh.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: They may have shown you
6	something like that.
7	MR. LEROUX: Oh, to elaborate on this, to
8	make it bigger?
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Well, to set out what they
10	believe you told them. So sometimes it's what they do
11	is they take their notes and they write up or type up a
12	synopsis afterwards. Maybe that's the document you might
13	have seen.
14	MR. LEROUX: Well, it's a possibility.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. All right.
16	You didn't get any notes from the officers
17	that day, or any statements? You didn't get anything from
18	them that day?
19	MR. LEROUX: No.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm talking about
21	November 25 th , 1993.
22	MR. LEROUX: No, he put some documents down
23	on the table and went through it, and then he left.
24	We're talking Maine?
25	MR. ENGELMANN: No. We're not in Maine.

1	MR. LEROUX: Okay.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: We're in Summerstown,
3	November 25 th , 1993, you meet with two officers.
4	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Officer Dussault, and you
6	don't remember his name, and you've signed this note, and
7	then there's an Officer Millar that you meet in his police
8	car; correct?
9	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: And did either of those
11	officers on that day give you a note or a statement that
12	you would have signed or given?
13	MR. LEROUX: You mean to take with me?
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes.
15	MR. LEROUX: No.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
17	But in late March of '94, when Officers
18	McDonell and Fagan saw you, you say they showed you some
19	documents?
20	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, they left you some
21	documents; did they not?
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Did they leave something
23	with you?
24	MR. LEROUX: Not those guys.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Oh, okay. Sorry.

1	MR. LEROUX: No, this was later on when
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes. That was
3	MR. LEROUX: In '99 when I run into them at
4	the hotel.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Right. And they left you
6	some things to read?
7	MR. LEROUX: From 44 Pine Street.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Officers Genier and Hall?
9	MR. LEROUX: Genier and Hall. Sorry, yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Again, sir, your and I
11	want to go back here again, but your belief that it might
12	have been in '99 is just because of your address? You're
13	not sure of the date, are you?
14	MR. LEROUX: No.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Now, sir, I want to ask you
16	a couple of questions about Mr. Seguin's funeral and events
17	at around that time.
18	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: My understanding is that
20	there was a mass or a funeral service the following Monday.
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: And there was also a
23	visitation or a viewing the day before at a funeral home.
24	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you recall which funeral

1	home?
2	MR. LEROUX: Next to the Hodges building on
3	Pitt Street Ron Wilson's Funeral Parlour.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
5	And did you attend both the viewing on the
6	Sunday and then the funeral and mass on Monday?
7	MR. LEROUX: I'm not sure of the days, but I
8	went to the viewing and I also went did part of the
9	funeral.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, it's my understanding
11	that you had some discussions with individuals either at
12	the viewing or at the funeral.
13	I want to ask you first about the viewing at
14	the funeral home. Do you recall having some discussions
15	with individuals there?
16	MR. LEROUX: Two.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. And who were those
18	two individuals you would have spoken to there?
19	MR. LEROUX: The first one was Ron Wilson.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: So Ron Wilson who was the
21	owner of the funeral home?
22	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, he wanted to talk to me
23	in his office.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: And he's also a fellow that
25	you've described as having been at various places.

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: With Ken and others.
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. So did you go and
5	talk to him at his office?
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: And was anyone else with
8	you?
9	MR. LEROUX: My wife.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: And what was discussed? Why
11	did he want to talk to you?
12	MR. LEROUX: He asked me if about if I
13	knew which David Silmser is. Is that the one from Fifth
14	Street or if I knew DS, I think he started out the
15	conversation. And when I said "David Silmser" he said "Do
16	you know where if he's the one from Fifth Street?" I
17	says "I don't know." I said "I just know he's not in
18	Cornwall anymore. So like quizzing. He said "Well, a lot
19	of people are going to be in trouble over this."
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Had Mr. Wilson ever been
21	present when Charles MacDonald or Malcolm MacDonald or Ken
22	Seguin had talked about David Silmser in your presence?
23	MR. LEROUX: No.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
25	So he's asking you whether you know this

1	guy?
2	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Or know of him?
4	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: And he's telling you that
6	some people are going to be in trouble?
7	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: For what? About what?
9	MR. LEROUX: He named four or five people.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you remember some of
11	those names?
12	MR. LEROUX: Claude Shaver, Malcolm
13	MacDonald, Rocky. That's all I can remember.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: So you remember three names?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, there might have been
16	more.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Take a look at Exhibit 567
18	for a minute. It's paragraph 38. I want to ask you a
19	couple of questions about this.
20	This discussion with Ron Wilson
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: is it at the day of the
23	mass, the funeral mass, or is it the day of the viewing?
24	MR. LEROUX: He was still laid out in the
25	other room. And he took them on a tour of the place. He

1	showed them around, like where they do embalming and stuff
2	like that; my wife and Dustin. And
3	MR. ENGELMANN: So he was in an open casket?
4	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: And people were viewing the
6	casket?
7	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: So it was that day, or was
9	it the day of the funeral, or do you remember?
10	MR. LEROUX: Can't really remember. I know
11	I was there twice. I didn't even want to go to the church
12	because I don't like going into churches, but we stayed way
13	at the back. And I had a run in with MacDonald there.
14	Anyway
15	MR. ENGELMANN: So let's just talk about Ron
16	Wilson.
17	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: The discussion was at the
19	funeral home or is it at the church?
20	MR. LEROUX: It's in the office; in his
21	office at the funeral parlour.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Now, you make
23	some, in this affidavit, there is a reference to him
24	talking to you and it says that, and I'm just looking, he's
25	also mentioning the name Father Charlie.

1	MR. LEROUX: Oh, yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you remember if he would
3	have mentioned Charles MacDonald?
4	MR. LEROUX: Definitely.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. There's a
6	reference to a Crown attorney.
7	MR. LEROUX: No.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you who that would be?
9	Or why that's there?
10	MR. LEROUX: There was no name with that
11	just said "The Crown" or "The Crown attorney", something
12	like that. I don't know.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: There's something in here
14	about he then stated:
15	"They will eventually get to the bottom
16	of all of it. I stated there were
17	others".
18	Did this happen, this discussion? Do you
19	I mean
20	MR. LEROUX: I don't know where the rest of
21	this came from. I have no idea. He stated that he'd
22	eventually get to the bottom of it. I stated that there
23	were others. No, that's
24	MR. ENGELMANN: What do you remember, sir,
25	if anything about your conversation with Ron Wilson?

1	MR. LEROUX: Just remember he mentioned
2	Shaver, the Bishop, Malcolm and Charlie.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: In what why did he
4	mention them? Like in what context?
5	MR. LEROUX: He said they were going to be
6	in trouble. There's going to be they investigated this.
7	They'd be in some kind of trouble. I don't know.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you know who "they" was?
9	They investigated?
10	MR. LEROUX: What's the question?
11	MR. ENGELMANN: You're talking about the
12	police, or do you know?
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes, there was a police
14	investigation about this.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. You said there
16	were two people that you spoke to at the funeral home.
17	Remember who the other person was, other than Mr. Wilson?
18	MR. LEROUX: Yes; coming out, I see Joss.
19	He had been talking in the driveway.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Joss?
21	MR. LEROUX: Van Diepen.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: You see him in the driveway
23	coming out of the funeral home?
24	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: What do you remember of that

1	conversation?
2	MR. LEROUX: Just a little argument about
3	something, I'm not even sure any more what the hell I said.
4	But we got into a little bit of an argument, something
5	about work; paperwork that he had left behind or something
6	like that. I said you know we had a discussion of
7	it.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: How did you know him?
9	MR. LEROUX: He worked shoulder to shoulder
10	with Ken Seguin; he said Ken said.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Would you see him from time
12	to time socially?
13	MR. LEROUX: Who?
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Joss Van Diepen.
15	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, in the restaurant
16	occasionally.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. You mentioned he was
18	at Harv's.
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Was he ever over at Ken's?
21	MR. LEROUX: I don't think so; didn't like
22	him that much.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry.
24	MR. LEROUX: I don't know. No.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: You don't recall him being

1	tnere?
2	MR. LEROUX: Like to associate, like to sit
3	in, have a tea or something, or go fishing?
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Whatever.
5	MR. LEROUX: He might have, but I didn't see
6	him.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. So if he was there,
8	he wasn't there frequently.
9	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: And do you recall why you
11	had a bit of an argument with him at the funeral home that
12	day?
13	MR. LEROUX: Well, I got thinking of the 20
14	year pin they threw at him and I guess he was always he
15	picked at him a lot, I mean, about his he picked at him.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Who picked at whom?
17	MR. LEROUX: You asked him a question, he
18	says he wouldn't answer you. He was abrupt with him in the
19	office and stuff like that. And he had taken his territory
20	away from him up in Morrisburg; stuff like that that Ken
21	would say. So I presume that they were not getting along.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So Ken was
23	talking to you about his relationship with Joss.
24	MR. LEROUX: Yeah. Then Joss said something
25	when we were at the funeral parlour. Well, I'd warn him I

1	don't how many times. I warned him. Well, a warning
2	what the hell is a warning going to do?
3	THE COMMISSIONER: What's a warning about?
4	MR. LEROUX: About his fooling with his
5	young parolees.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: You have to speak into the
7	microphone.
8	MR. LEROUX: Fooling around with his young
9	parolees whatever they
10	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: So
13	MR. LEROUX: Told him to watch his step.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Van Diepen?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yeah. I told him to watch his
16	step. I told him
17	MR. ENGELMANN: So Mr. Van Diepen was
18	telling you that he had warned Ken about his behaviour.
19	MR. LEROUX: Yeah. Warned him about his
20	behaviour and you know "I don't know how many times I
21	told him to watch his step". He knew what he was doing,
22	apparently. He knew what he was doing what Ken was
23	doing.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Why the argument?
25	MR. LEROUX: Why didn't he help him? He is
43	MR. DEROUA: Willy didn't he help hills he is

1	in the office with him. He knew he was having problems.
2	You work in an office for years with somebody and you work
3	with him every day. Why be mean to them? Why don't you go
4	and help them. Why didn't he go to Corrections and Parole
5	and say, "Look this guy should be should not be here.
6	This guy should have another be in another branch or
7	something of the government, or should be doing something
8	else, because I know what he's doing." But if you know and
9	you don't help, I mean, what the hell is this
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Leroux?
11	MR. LEROUX: Yes?
12	MR. ENGELMANN: Couldn't he say the same
13	about you?
14	MR. LEROUX: Sure, he could have. Yes.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Couldn't he have said the
16	same about you?
17	MR. LEROUX: Yes. Oh, he didn't like me
18	either.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: No, but you say
20	Mr. Van Diepen should have helped him; should have told
21	people
22	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: But you could have done that
24	too sir.
25	MR. LEROUX: I did.

2	MR. LEROUX: I did to the best of my
3	ability. I did.

7	even call the cops for a car accident. (Laughter/rires.)
8	MR. ENGELMANN: But. Mr. Van Diepen could
9	have spoken to his boss about Ken and what he knew about
10	Ken. Couldn't you have spoken to Ken's boss, as well?
11	MR. LEROUX: I was with Ken's boss at we
12	took our dogs to a training thing every Friday night, at a
13	school on $3^{\rm rd}$ Street. This guy, you just couldn't talk to
14	him. He was arrogant. He was
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Which boss are you
16	talking about there?
17	MR. LEROUX: Mr. Robert Emile Robert.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. M'hm.
19	MR. LEROUX: He'd always have his kids with
20	him so you wouldn't say so much, and I'd always say "How's
21	Ken doing?" hint around, but there was nothing coming
22	back.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Leroux?
24	MR. LEROUX: Pardon?
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Sorry.

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes?
2	MR. ENGELMANN: You go ahead.
3	MR. LEROUX: We might have had six Friday
4	nights with the dogs there and the guy was couldn't make
5	an association with him then.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: You mentioned Ken telling
7	you from time to time about his relationship with
8	Mr. Van Diepen.
9	MR. LEROUX: The question?
10	MR. ENGELMANN: You mentioned to us that Ken
11	told you from time to time about his relationship with Mr.
12	Van Diepen.
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: And you talked about him
15	picking at him or picking on him or words to that effect.
16	MR. LEROUX: Yes, when we'd go to the
17	restaurant, he'd say "That a-hole" and things like that;
18	giving me a hard time; picking at me and making snide
19	remarks. Every day was something.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: What about Morrisburg
21	what was it about Morrisburg that Mr. Seguin told you?
22	MR. LEROUX: Well, it was a young I think
23	he said something about a young offenders' territory that
24	he was looking after up there.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes?

1	MR. LEROUX: And Joss applied and he got
2	or went to his boss or something and took his territory
3	from him; and a company car, and a government car. So he
4	lost that.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you know if Mr. Seguin
6	was senior to Mr. Van Diepen in the workplace or not? Do
7	you know what I mean by that?
8	MR. LEROUX: I no.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you know if he'd been
10	there longer or about the same?
11	MR. LEROUX: Probably about the same. I
12	know he got his 20-year pin, I don't know I don't
13	If he told me, I wouldn't remember. I don't know. Just
14	complained about a hard time, all the time.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: It might be time for
16	morning break, Mr. Engelmann.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Sure.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: We'll take the morning
19	break, sir.
20	THE REGISTRAR: Order; all rise. À l'ordre;

1	THE REGISTRAR: The hearing is now resumed.

4	THE COMMISSIONER: How are you holding out,
5	sir?
6	MR. LEROUX: I'm all right. I'm tired but
7	I'm all right.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry?
9	MR. LEROUX: I'm all right.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
11	Well, if at any time you want a break or
12	anything like that you let me know. All right?
13	EXAMINATION IN CHIEF BY/INTERROGATOIRE EN-CHEF PAR MR.
14	PETER ENGELMANN (C'ont/Suite):
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Are you ready to start, Mr.
16	Leroux?
17	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. Just before I ask you
19	a couple of questions I just have to tell the Commissioner
20	and Counsel a couple of things. So I'll just be a minute,
21	if I can.
22	MR. LEROUX: Fine.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Commissioner, I just
24	want to advise you and Counsel that we have received a
25	certificate of production from Mr. Bourgeois.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: So there are no further
3	documents to be added to the database
4	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: from him.
6	I also wanted to advise you that a number of
7	the exhibits that we've been putting in have reference to
8	C-8, and I just wanted to list them for the record.
9	They're subject to a publication ban.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: One of them was an exhibit
12	that went in through Mr. Renshaw; that's 552.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: And the ones through
15	Mr. Leroux: 562, 563, 564, 565, 566, 567, 568, 569, 570,
16	571 and 574.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
18	So, Madam Clerk, you'll see to it that the
19	stamp is put on so that anyone from the public who might be
20	viewing these documents would be made aware of the
21	publication ban.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Leroux, I had asked you
23	about a couple of conversations that you'd had at the
24	funeral home, and you told us about a conversation with Ron
25	Wilson. You also told us about a conversation you had with

1	Joss Van Diepen. You mentioned, as well, that you had a
2	conversation with Malcolm MacDonald, and I believe you told
3	us that was at the church.
4	MR. LEROUX: The round house beside the
5	church.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
7	So was that at was that the same day as
8	the funeral mass, sir?
9	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: And can you tell us what it
11	is you remember of that encounter with Malcolm MacDonald?
12	MR. LEROUX: People standing in a line-up
13	picking up food. It's like a buffet-type thing after the
14	funeral.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes.
16	MR. LEROUX: And there was a woman who come
17	up to me and said, "Did you know him?" and I said "Yeah."
18	She said "It's too bad to be so young and die of a heart
19	attack." I said "It's not a heart attack." I said "He
20	committed suicide."
21	And Malcolm yells out "You come here. You
22	shut up. Keep your mouth shut." He said "Sit down here."
23	My wife was with me. She said "What's with him?" I said
24	"He just wants to talk." He said "Keep your mouth shut
25	about the circumstances of his death, and keep your mouth

1	shut about everything you know. Just shut up. Keep your
2	mouth shut."
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you have any
4	conversations with Malcolm MacDonald after that?
5	MR. LEROUX: No. No.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Now, Mr. Leroux, I think
7	you've already told us that you moved to Maine early in
8	1994.
9	MR. LEROUX: February.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: And you've told us, as well,
11	that Officers McDonell and Fagan came to see you in late
12	March when you were in Maine.
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes, because within 30 days I
14	moved to Pleasant Street.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay.
16	MR. LEROUX: Thirty (30) days it had to
17	be in March roughly.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: And, sir, were you aware
19	that they were coming to see you concerning the death of
20	your friend Ken Seguin?
21	MR. LEROUX: No.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Why did you think they were
23	coming to see you?
24	THE COMMISSIONER: No.
25	MR. LEROUX: Well, I misunderstood. Wait a

1	second here.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: No, no, no.
3	MR. LEROUX: You lost me.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: I can understand what
5	you're saying.
6	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: Sorry, maybe I wasn't clear.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, the question could
9	go two ways. Try again.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
11	Do you know why they were coming to see you?
12	MR. LEROUX: I didn't know they were coming
13	to see me at all. I didn't let anyone know that I had
14	moved there yet.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
16	So how is it that they met with you there?
17	MR. LEROUX: I heard a knock at the front
18	door; walked down the long hallway to the front door, and I
19	see Chris McDonell and a police officer in a suit; show
20	their badges; come in.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Were either of them familiar
22	to you?
23	MR. LEROUX: Chris was.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: How did you know him?
25	MR. LEROUX: OPP at Lancaster Detachment.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: You'd had meetings with him
2	before or conversations with him before?
3	MR. LEROUX: Well, it's not a very big area,
4	but
5	MR. ENGELMANN: He was a local police
6	officer?
7	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: So you knew him. You didn't
9	know the other fellow?
10	MR. LEROUX: A lot of them frequented the
11	store down the road.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
13	MR. LEROUX: A lot of them would frequent my
14	uncle's store. My uncle had a store.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
16	MR. LEROUX: Anyway, I'm not going to go off
17	on another tangent here.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
19	So they showed up at your house. And did
20	they explain to you why they were there?
21	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, just in the
22	neighbourhood. He said "We came up from Bangor." Not
23	Banger, Bangor Bangor, Maine.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
25	MR. LEROUX: They were in the neighbourhood.

1	Like, Bangor is a couple of hours, maybe two-and-a-half
2	hours from there.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Did they tell you what they
4	were doing in Bangor, Maine?
5	MR. LEROUX: No.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
7	Did they tell you why they wanted to see
8	you?
9	MR. LEROUX: Yes. He said "We brought up a
10	document. We just want you to look at it and see if
11	there's anything you'd like to add to it." I told him "Not
12	really, no."
13	I said "Who's he? This other police
14	officer?" "Oh," he said, "He's in with the Ottawa police;
15	they're doing they're investigating with us or
16	investigating us," or something like that, to that effect.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: Might he have said that he
18	was another OPP officer, but from the Ottawa area?
19	MR. LEROUX: Oh, that's possible. That's
20	possible. I just found it strange that they'd I asked
21	him why they would bring in an Ottawa police officer.
22	Well, he said they were investigating "our
23	investigation," or something like that.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: They're investigating our
25	investigation?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Something like that?
3	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
5	MR. LEROUX: He didn't say "assist". He
6	said "investigating our investigations" something like
7	that.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: And, sir, perhaps if the
9	witness can be shown Exhibit 562.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: It's in a paper form, as
11	well, if you're interested in that.
12	Okay. What part did you want to go to?
13	So this is an interview report of a
14	conversation you would have had with McDonell and Fagan at
15	your home in Maine.
16	MR. LEROUX: Okay.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: So, sir, you recall the day
18	or the day after Mr. Seguin died you had a couple of
19	interviews with two officers, an Officer Dussault and an
20	Officer Miller; correct?
21	MR. LEROUX: Vaguely, yes.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: On November 25 th , 1993,
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: the day you and your
25	wife found Ken Seguin's body, two police officers asked you

1	some questions.
2	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: And, sir, is this then the
4	next time a police officer asks you any questions about Mr.
5	Seguin's death? This is now March 28 th , 1994.
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
8	And it appears, sir, that you tell them a
9	little bit more this time.
10	MR. LEROUX: It's a possibility.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: For example, you talk about
12	Ken being out on the ice. You talk about Ken being
13	depressed; things of that nature.
14	MR. LEROUX: Because he asked me if he ever
15	tried to do anything like this previous to that.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay.
17	You don't tell them anything about you
18	mention
19	MR. LEROUX: I backed off for for
20	MR. ENGELMANN: You mention the name
21	Silmser. And I'm looking at the last page of your
22	statement, but you don't really say much about him.
23	MR. LEROUX: No, because he wanted to get me
24	out of there. He wanted to get me outside out to the
25	garage, and I said, "No. I'm not no leave I don't

1	talk to anybody unless I have a witness or my wife is
2	here".
3	MR. ENGELMANN: So you're talking one of
4	these two police officers wanted you to come outside and
5	talk?
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: This is in Maine, now,
8	eh?
9	MR. LEROUX: In Maine; yes.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. All right.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: I just want to ask you a
12	couple more questions about this.
13	On the last page you talk about a phone
14	book; you talk about, in fact, you said you gave it to
15	Doug, in front of Gerry; not to Gerry?
16	MR. LEROUX: I gave it to Gerry. I didn't
17	see Doug. I gave it to him when he was standing in the
18	garage at Summerstown.
19	I paced up and down on the floor. He drove
20	in. I popped the door open. I said, "Look, give this to
21	Doug."
22	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
23	MR. LEROUX: " or whatever you want to
24	do with it, but I should give it to Doug."
25	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: You also say, sir, just
2	before that you said, "I found Ken's phone book, and
3	that's where I got Father Charlie's phone number."
4	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
5	THE COMMISSIONER: "I had put the phone book
6	in my pocket, and forgot to put it back."
7	MR. LEROUX: That's the story I gave him,
8	because I thought you could get maybe you'd get arrested
9	for removing some evidence
10	THE COMMISSIONER: I see.
11	MR. LEROUX: from the crime scene, so
12	THE COMMISSIONER: A crime scene?
13	MR. LEROUX: Well, whatever.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
15	MR. LEROUX: Because I was later told by
16	is it all right if I get a little ahead a little bit here?
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Certainly.
18	MR. LEROUX: It'll throw some get some
19	light on this?
20	The police officers who were investigating
21	the Ken's suicide, had classified it as a
22	suicide/murder.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Who told you that, sir?
24	MR. LEROUX: Mr. Dunlop.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay.

1	I guess, sir, it's well and I'm just
2	looking at the second last page of the statement, at the
3	bottom.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: Riveting questions, Mr.
5	Englemann.
6	Madam Clerk?
7	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm glad no one's snoring.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Could you send a note
9	downstairs and tell them to stop. Okay.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, on the second last
11	page, at the bottom, you suggest that you actually reached
12	Father Charlie on the phone.
13	MR. LEROUX: That's a
14	MR. ENGELMANN: I know, in another
15	statement, you say you left a message on his answering
16	machine, which is what you've said today. So which is it?
17	MR. LEROUX: I left a message. I never
18	spoke to the man.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: On the last page of the
20	statement you talk about Silmser
21	THE COMMISSIONER: Where?
22	MR. ENGELMANN: but there's no talk about
23	phone calls. There's no talk about him asking for money?
24	MR. LEROUX: Second interview?
25	MR. ENGELMANN: No, this is the interview in

1	March '94.
2	MR. LEROUX: In May the second interview.
3	It's because he he's playing a game with me.
4	He wanted me outside to talk in the garage,
5	so Anyway, he said "Just for a minute. I want to look
6	at it." There was a car out there; a Super B, or
7	something. So he hauls me out and he's looking at the car
8	and he wanted to see the engine a big 440 in it. He's
9	playing an idea with a car.
10	Then he started asking me some other
11	questions about C-9 and through that
12	MR. ENGELMANN: C-8?
13	MR. LEROUX: C-8; C-8.
14	So then I started climbing out. I said,
15	"You've got no more information; that's it." So I walked
16	out of there, and then I walked back into the house, and
17	_
18	MR. ENGELMANN: I guess what I want to know
19	is at some point you open up a bit.
20	MR. LEROUX: Probably would've got more if
21	they would've played their cards right with me.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
23	Because you don't say anything about Ken and
24	probationers and sex.
25	MR. LEROUX: No!

1	MR. ENGELMANN: And you don't say anything
2	about David Silmser alleging that he was molested and
3	asking for money.
4	MR. LEROUX: No.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: You just mention the name.
6	MR. LEROUX: My wife's sitting there.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
8	MR. LEROUX: I have well, my wife's
9	sitting with me at this table, with these two 'Blue
10	Angels'.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, this is in March of
12	194.
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: The next statement we have
15	involving you and the OPP is in February of 1997. So it's
16	almost three years later.
17	MR. LEROUX: Possibility.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay.
19	And that's in Orillia, where you were
20	accompanied by a Mr. Charles Bourgeois.
21	Do you remember that trip and that day? And
22	we talked about it a little yesterday.
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: About how long it was.
25	MR. LEROUX: Pardon me?

1	MR. ENGELMANN: We talked about how long you
2	were there in Orillia. Do you remember even the
3	Commissioner even asked you, was it four or five hours, et
4	cetera.
5	MR. LEROUX: Day trip.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes.
7	So in between that discussion that we've
8	just gone through March 28^{th} '94 and February 7^{th} of '97,
9	do you start having some contact from Perry Dunlop?
10	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: And, sir, it's my
12	understanding that that contact starts sometime in the fall
13	of 1996. Is that correct?
14	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
15	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Exhibit 563, please.
17	Sir, this is the first statement or
18	interview we appear to have between you and Mr. Dunlop, and
19	it's dated October 10 th , 1996.
20	And I guess, what I'd like to know is and
21	it says that you're living, I guess at that time at 17
22	Pleasant Street in Norway, Maine. Do you see that?
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you know how it is that
25	Mr. Dunlop found his way to Norway, Maine, and to you,

1	specifically?
2	MR. LEROUX: That's what I asked him.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: How did you first meet him?
4	MR. LEROUX: Over the phone. He had a phone
5	number; he had an address; and he wanted to talk to me.
6	And I said, no. And he got the the answer to your
7	question was from C-8.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: He told you he got your
9	phone number and address from C-8?
10	MR. LEROUX: That's correct.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: And did he explain to you on
12	the phone, the first time he called you, why he wanted to
13	speak to you?
14	MR. LEROUX: In a round-about way concerning
15	Mr. Seguin.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: So what did he tell you,
17	that first phone call?
18	MR. LEROUX: He told me he would like to get
19	together with me and go around some of the circumstances
20	surrounding his death.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Whose death?
22	MR. LEROUX: Mr. Seguin.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: And did you agree to meet
24	with him?
25	MR. LEROUX: It was very vague and I said,

1	"No." I said, "No, I'm away from there. I've " So
2	then he said, "Think about it".
3	He gave me a number. The number I
4	remember the last four digits of the number were 4747 cause
5	that's my date of birth; phone number to call him back; 932
6	or 933-4747; Cornwall number.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So after that
8	first call and you said you weren't going to meet with him,
9	did you call him back?
10	MR. LEROUX: No.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he call you back?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: And
14	THE COMMISSIONER: How long after the first
15	call did he call back?
16	MR. LEROUX: Oh, within a week, or so.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm. How did the I'm
18	sorry Mr. Engelmann.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: That's fine.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: How did he identify
21	himself the first time?
22	MR. LEROUX: As Mr. Perry Dunlop.
23	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. Did he any
24	mention that he was a police officer?

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MR. LEROUX: I knew he was.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: Right. Did he mention
2	that he was a police officer?
3	MR. LEROUX: No, he didn't. He didn't come
4	on that strong. It was like
5	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. Mr. Engelmann.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: So what happened in the
7	second phone call? Did he again ask if he could meet with
8	you?
9	MR. LEROUX: Well, he was he said "Well,
10	I'd really like to visit Maine" and he was building up, you
11	know, "It's nice mountains there; it's a nice place; I'd
12	like to check it out, and I'd like to meet your wife" and
13	you know "go out to dinner; do things" he was getting
14	friendly.
15	And I said "No, I don't be thinking so".
16	No. I see what was coming. I refused. Then that was
17	maybe 8, 10 o'clock at night; it was late. I remember it
18	was late because we were tired; I just got in from doing
19	something; it was late.
20	And the lawyers got me in the stairwell. I
21	was on the phone. I was on my way upstairs and the phone
22	rang. So I ran back down and got the portable. I was
23	sitting on the stairs talking to this lawyer and he was
24	shaking me up good like "You got to talk to him. You got
25	to meet him. You got to do this. You got to do that.

1	It's only right. I'm his lawyer"; stuff like that.	
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. So there was another	
3	phone call, and it was Mr. Dunlop's lawyer.	
4	MR. LEROUX: Yes, he said he was Charles	
5	Bourgeois from Toronto or	
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he tell you why you had	
7	to meet with Mr. Dunlop?	
8	MR. LEROUX: Well, he said we have some	
9	information from C-9 or C-8 and he tells us that you	
10	have a lot of vital information that you're holding back.	
11	You know more things about what's going around this	
12	surrounding his death, and so on.	
13	And then he said something, "Well, you could	
14	be charged with obstruction of the justice". He was	
15	throwing a lot of things at me; very fast talking. He said	
16	"Just come down and meet you for a few hours and talk to	
17	you, and we'll let's just wanted".	
18	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Before that call	
19	from Mr. Bourgeois who identified himself as Mr. Dunlop's	
20	lawyer, do you know how many calls you'd had from Mr.

17	MR. ENGELMANN: Is that in Norway, Maine?
18	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, Cheryl gave me the key
19	because we were in there too long and
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Let me just stop you.
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes?
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Were they in the
23	neighbourhood when he called, or were they calling from
24	Ontario or do you remember?
25	MR. LEROUX: No, no.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: That second time he called.
2	MR. LEROUX: No, no. They weren't there
3	yet.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Sorry?
5	MR. LEROUX: They were still in Ontario.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
7	MR. LEROUX: They gave me a timeframe that
8	they would be down and make myself available and They
9	came right to the house.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And the first
11	time you met with Mr. Dunlop, was he with his lawyer,
12	Mr. Bourgeois?
13	MR. LEROUX: Oh, yes.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: Was there anybody else who
15	was present?
16	MR. LEROUX: No.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. And you said you
18	had the meeting in a restaurant near your home?
19	MR. LEROUX: Barjos.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: That's the name of the
21	restaurant?
22	MR. LEROUX: $B-A-R-J-O-'-S$.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. And they told you
24	they were interested in Ken Seguin's death.
25	MR. LEROUX: Yes.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: Is that what the discussion
2	was about or did they discuss other things with you as
3	well?
4	MR. LEROUX: Not right away. We went
5	through the house; like checked it out all over. I had
6	four bedrooms and a pool room upstairs. And I say, "We can
7	work here in this room if you want. We'll talk here".
8	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm confused Mr. Leroux. I
9	thought you said you were meeting them in a restaurant.
10	MR. LEROUX: Wait a second. I said they
11	came to the house.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry.
13	MR. LEROUX: It took them five-and-a-half
14	hours to get there roughly I figured. So, that's a
15	five-and-a-half to six hour drive. It's roughly just under
16	400 miles; 378 something.

17	that's enough. I've got enough. I've got to get home".
18	And Cheryl said, "Yes, I have to close." That's why she
19	says, "Here's the key, close up when you leave".
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Did they ask you questions
21	about probationers of Ken's?
22	MR. LEROUX: Right there and right then?
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Yeah.
24	MR. LEROUX: No.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: At one of your meetings in

1	October 1996, would they have done that?

17	own free will" and you sign it. Do you know
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Sorry. Madam Clerk, can
19	you put it
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Turn to the last page.
21	THE COMMISSIONER: No, bottom.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: The last page.
23	THE COMMISSIONER: There it is. Keep going.
24	Keep going. There you go.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Leroux, you've told us

1	there were a lot of meetings, so you may not be able to
2	remember this, but do you know if this document would have
3	been prepared at or around the time of your second meeting,
4	or can you tell us?
5	MR. LEROUX: That's my signature. When did
6	this statement was made by me October the $10^{\rm th}$, 1996.
7	That's not my writing. And this looks like P. Dunlop or
8	Perry I don't know.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: So the question really is
11	at the second meeting, right, upstairs in the hotel room
12	_
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: were you asked to
15	sign a statement? Did they give you something to read
16	over?
17	MR. LEROUX: No.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
19	MR. LEROUX: No, I did a lot of signing,
20	mostly in Toronto.
21	THE COMMISSIONER: Right.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you remember signing
23	anything in Maine, sir?
24	MR. LEROUX: I might have. I don't
25	remember.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: Can you look at the front
2	page of 563. If you look in your book you'll see the paper
3	copy of that, 563. Okay. Look at the front of that. This
4	is the document.
5	Do you recognize this document?
6	No 563, Madam Clerk. That's not the one.
7	So just take a minute and look at this then.
8	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
9	THE COMMISSIONER: So what you're telling me
10	is that you don't remember signing anything like that at
11	your second meeting. Is that fair?
12	MR. LEROUX: That's fair, yes.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
14	Mr. Engelmann.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: I'll just be one moment.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: So during that second
17	meeting in a hotel room, while your wife is listening to
18	music downstairs, did you talk about anything different
19	then what you did the first night at the restaurant?
20	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, he was he had
21	bringing in pictures, all kinds of pictures, and all kinds
22	of documents and paperwork and stuff in boxes, and stacking
23	it up there and asking more questions. And I don't even
24	remember what, but it was just like then within a week
25	of, or I don't know, maybe a week or 10 days, I don't know

1	long periods of time, I mean night after night after
2	night, stuff started getting strewed more all over the
3	floor.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: And just out of interest,
5	was there any alcohol being consumed during those times?
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: By whom?
8	MR. LEROUX: Me; the lawyer. I put him in
9	the taxi a few times. Sent him over in Toronto at 3:00 in
10	the morning.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. Never mind Toronto
12	now.
13	MR. LEROUX: All right. Okay.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: At the restaurant.
15	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, we'd go downstairs to the
16	bar and they had Karaoke there and he would sing.
17	Everybody thought he was Garth Brooks.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Who would sing?
19	MR. LEROUX: Perry.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay.
21	MR. LEROUX: Fantastic singer.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay.
23	MR. LEROUX: And a good piano player.
24	My wife is kind of like mesmerized by the
25	music and his singing

1	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. So let me understand,
2	sir.
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Was he there for several
5	days in a row; he and his lawyer?
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: That first time?
8	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: And there would have been
10	several meetings?
11	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: You've told the Commissioner
13	there was sometimes at the meetings there would be a supper
14	and there'd be drinks.
15	MR. LEROUX: We'd drink in the motel room.
16	There was usually beer bottles in the see, I don't drink
17	beer, but I I'm not supposed to be drinking anyway, but
18	I had an occasional drink, but it would end up to be more
19	than that, I'll be honest with you.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: And now and then
21	MR. LEROUX: Vodka mudslides.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
23	MR. LEROUX: Vodka.
24	THE COMMISSIONER: So you're drinking vodka,
25	the other guys are drinking beer?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yeah. So we had it in the
2	hotel room. He always made sure there was a bottle there.
3	I put milk in it.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: Milk and vodka?
5	MR. LEROUX: And I'm lactose intolerant, as
6	well. I have to take pills to take the booze, I don't
7	know, just
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Were you drunk at some of
9	these meetings, sir?
10	MR. LEROUX: Possibly.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Were they?
12	MR. LEROUX: Well, feeling good.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. When you were shown
14	pictures
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: do you remember how
17	pictures were shown to you?
18	MR. LEROUX: They were all over the floor.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Let me ask you this; was
20	there a name attached to the picture?
21	MR. LEROUX: No.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. Were you asked to
23	name
24	MR. LEROUX: The names were on the back.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. Were you asked to

1	name who the people were.
2	MR. LEROUX: He showed me people that I
3	knew, people that
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he suggest names to you
5	of others?
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes. He says, "Oh, come on.
7	You know this person." I said "No." "Come on. You
8	know"
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, hold on a second.
11	You're imitating somebody who is showing you
12	a photograph.
13	MR. LEROUX: Exactly. He showed a
14	photograph.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: He showed you a
16	photograph, and then?
17	MR. LEROUX: He'd go, "I'll show you a
18	photograph" and hold it up.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Yeah.
20	MR. LEROUX: "Do you know who that is?"
21	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
22	MR. LEROUX: "You know I know who it is. Do
23	you know who it is?"
24	THE COMMISSIONER: You've got to speak into
25	the microphone.

1	MR. LEROUX: Okay. He's holding it up. "Do
2	you see the face? Can you make it out?" Hold it a
3	distance back. I see better far than I do close. I'd say
4	the name. Then he'd turn it around and he'd say, "That's
5	right."
6	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
7	MR. LEROUX: "Do you know this person?"
8	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
9	MR. LEROUX: If I didn't know it, well,
10	that's fine. "Do you know this person?" Then he'd put
11	them all over the floor. Then you'd walk around; you see
12	them all over the floor. "Don't let anybody in here,
13	because I'm going to leave all this stuff all over the
14	floor. Let's go out." We'd go to Kelsey's bar or
15	something if we were in Toronto, or if we were down there
16	we'd go downstairs to the bar. We'd sit around and talk
17	and have a few and go back up.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
20	So some of the people you were able to
21	identify?
22	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Some of the people you
24	weren't?
25	MR. LEROUX: Yes.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: And if you weren't, did he
2	tell you who they were?
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you remember some of the
5	names of people that you were not able to identify, but
6	that Mr. Dunlop identified for you?
7	MR. LEROUX: No, he wouldn't he'd show me
8	the picture. If I couldn't identify, "that's okay.
9	That's fine".
10	MR. ENGELMANN: All right, well, what is it
11	sir? Did he if you couldn't identify the person, did he
12	then tell you the person's name or did he put it aside?
13	MR. LEROUX: Put it aside.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. He always had
15	them in, like a book, like this.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: Three-ring binder?
17	MR. LEROUX: And he'd take them all out.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay, so they were in a
19	binder?
20	MR. LEROUX: Yeah.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Sir, you met
22	with him for a number of days in a row.
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: The first time.
25	MR. LEROUX: Yes.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: And did he come back to
2	Maine later in October?
3	MR. LEROUX: When you're down so many times,
4	I don't I couldn't tell you if it was September,
5	October, November or December; I don't know.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Well, there's a document
7	that purports to be an affidavit. It's Exhibit 564.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: It is unsigned.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: That's right. It is dated
10	October $31^{\rm st}$. There is another copy of this, sir. It is
11	handwritten, and it is signed October 31 st .
12	Mr. Leroux, I am going to suggest to you
13	that
14	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry, where is the
15	handwritten one?
16	MR. ENGELMANN: I am just going to find it
17	sir. I didn't have it entered.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: If the witness could be
20	shown document number 716091.
21	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
22	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Exhibit No.
23	576 is a handwritten document. Oh, this one is sworn. Ah,
24	I see; I see.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, I believe, and I say I

1	believe that this document is identical to Exhibit 564,
2	save and except the last paragraph.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: Which the last
4	paragraph being ?
5	MR. ENGELMANN: The last paragraph on the
6	new document, the handwritten document, 576.
7	EXHIBIT NO./PIÈCE NO. 576:
8	(716091) Affidavit of Ron Leroux, sworn on
9	31 October 1996
10	THE COMMISSIONER: "And I make this oath
11	believing it to be true"?
12	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: And of course the dura.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. So can you look at
16	the last page, Mr. Leroux? Is that your signature?
17	MR. LEROUX: It looks like it.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: So Mr. Leroux I'm going to
19	suggest to you that
20	MR. LEROUX: I didn't write this though.
21	This is not my writing.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
23	MR. LEROUX: None of that.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Someone wrote that up for
25	you?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes. I never wrote up
2	anything.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
4	MR. LEROUX: I don't write anything down;
5	no.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
7	MR. LEROUX: I didn't write this.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay, but it appears to
9	have been signed in October, in Maine, and Mr. Charles
10	J. Bourgeois would have commissioned this, meaning that he
11	would have asked you that do you make this oath
12	believing it to be true, et cetera. Do you have any memory
13	of that?
14	MR. LEROUX: Not really, but I remember
15	putting a lot of R.L.'s on a lot of papers.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
17	MR. LEROUX: It must be it.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay, it's your signature,
20	and it's your initials?
21	MR. LEROUX: Yes, but I never I never
22	read any of this, except time to sit down and he'd given
23	me a typed document and he wanted me to read it.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Who is that?
25	MR. LEROUX: Perry, I think.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
2	MR. LEROUX: I don't know whether Bourgeois
3	was there or not. I don't remember.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So let me just
5	understand.
6	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: You believe this was either
8	written by Mr. Dunlop or Mr. Bourgeois?
9	MR. LEROUX: Had to be, because I didn't
10	write it.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. But you
12	certainly signed it, sir?
13	MR. LEROUX: I would sign you can have
14	the Pope excommunicated, for Christ sakes. I mean this is
15	(laughter/rire).
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Why? What was going on?
17	MR. LEROUX: Pardon me?
18	I'm sorry. I just
19	MR. ENGELMANN: Well, let's go back to the
20	fall of 1996. Right?
21	MR. LEROUX: Fall of 1996, okay. Where are
22	we?
23	MR. ENGELMANN: You're in Maine.
24	MR. LEROUX: Okay.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Dunlop meets with you a

1	number of times.
2	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Day after day, according to
4	your evidence.
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: And then presumably he or he
7	and Mr. Bourgeois meet with you again right at the end of
8	October.
9	MR. LEROUX: Okay.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: I don't know if it this
11	is October $31^{\rm st}$, this would be Halloween. Does that any
12	recollection of meeting with Mr. Bourgeois and Mr. Dunlop
13	on October 31 st , 1996.
14	MR. LEROUX: You mean Halloween night?
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes?
16	THE COMMISSIONER: Or Halloween day.
17	MR. LEROUX: Halloween day. It's a
18	possibility; 1996. See we used to have Halloween parties
19	for the kids always. Every year we had something.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Well let me ask you this,
21	sir.
22	MR. LEROUX: And, just a minute yes, yes,
23	yes. Yes, we had a Halloween night down at the Ramada
24	because the kids were going to give out the candies and
25	stuff like that, and there was no party in '96. Yeah,

1	okay; yeah.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: So do you actually remember
3	meeting with Mr. Bourgeois to swear this affidavit on that
4	day?
5	MR. LEROUX: I don't know whether Bourgeois
6	was there or not. I have no idea, but I know Perry was
7	there. He could have been. I don't know.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: The reason I ask is because
9	his signature appears on the last page as having signed the
10	affidavit witnessing you swear the affidavit.
11	MR. LEROUX: I don't know.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, do you have any sense
13	as to how many times you would have met with Mr. Dunlop in
14	the fall of 1996 and early 1997?
15	MR. LEROUX: I don't remember. It was
16	plenty.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
18	MR. LEROUX: It was a lot of meetings.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: A lot of meetings.
20	MR. LEROUX: Right.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: So help me out. Were some of
22	the meetings with just you and Mr. Dunlop?
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: And some of the meetings, he

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had Mr. Bourgeois there?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: And some of the meetings
3	with Mr. Dunlop would there be another person there,
4	other than Mr. Bourgeois?
5	MR. LEROUX: Carson might have come down
6	with him a couple of times.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Was his wife,
8	Helen, ever there at meetings you would have had with him?
9	MR. LEROUX: No, she would stay she got
10	friendly with my wife.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: So I'm not just talking
12	about meetings in Maine. I am also talking about meetings
13	in Ontario.
14	MR. LEROUX: Yes, we all came up here.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So why is it,
16	sir, that you continue to meet with Mr. Dunlop?
17	MR. LEROUX: He just keeps calling and
18	calling, and calling. And I keep going, and going, and
19	going, and going.
20	He's digging. He's on a mission, I guess.
21	I don't know.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Is that what he told you?
23	MR. LEROUX: Well, he seemed to be.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Is that what he told you
25	that he had a mission or something to that effect?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he tell you what he was
3	trying to do?
4	MR. LEROUX: I'm not sure exactly what he
5	was trying to do but he was investigating constantly,
6	investigating this, investigating I don't know where the
7	hell he was coming from, but he just never seemed to end.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Were you working at the
9	time, Mr. Leroux?
10	MR. LEROUX: Trying to.
11	MR. ENGELMANN: Were you able to?
12	MR. LEROUX: No.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Why not?
14	MR. LEROUX: I couldn't focus any more.
15	Every time I get started on something, I get pulled away.
16	Ah, it's only going to be for a couple of days. You can
17	get back at it when you back. It was very I've never
18	seen oh, very persuasive.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: He, Mr. Dunlop
20	MR. LEROUX: He walked, yes, and let's rock
21	and roll and let's go, and let's go, and let's go.
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Are you okay, Mr. Leroux?
23	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, I'm fine.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Do you want a break, or
25	MR. LEROUX: No, shoot.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: So he'd say let's rock and
2	roll?
3	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: How long were these meetings
5	when you would meet?
6	MR. LEROUX: Oh, a day. You get into a
7	motel room; you spend all day in a motel. You go jogging
8	at 6:00 in the morning, and go eat or have some food sent
9	in.
10	I sent Bourgeois home a good many times in a
11	taxi, helped him down the stairs at 3:00 in the morning
12	cause he couldn't stand up. He had a he's only he
13	said I'm only married a few years and I'm going to end up
14	divorced I'm going to get divorced in this.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Did Mr. Dunlop tell you what
16	his purpose was, what he was trying to do?
17	MR. LEROUX: He got into some trouble over a
18	document that he had taken with the Chief of Police, and he
19	kind of said everybody on the Force hates me. He said I've
20	got to watch my back. He mentioned going to Toronto. I
21	don't get any back-up when I'm working and this and that
22	and.
23	One time I came up here he was at my house
24	on Sydney Street, at my mother's house. He was sitting in
25	the kitchen. He could hardly walk cause he got beat up.

1	This was around late I don't know 2000, 1999, 1998.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: This is much later now,
3	you're talking about?
4	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
5	MR. ENGELMANN: Let's try and stick to the
6	timeframe when you're having all these meetings and you're
7	doing these interviews and affidavits.
8	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: So he keeps wanting to talk
10	to you and you keep talking to him?
11	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: So you're cooperating?
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: What are your reasons for
15	cooperating with him and spending the time with him? Why
16	are you doing that?
17	MR. LEROUX: Because he's pushing me to do
18	it. He's buttering up my wife and being nice. He even
19	slept at the house a couple of nights there. He was real
20	nice. Oh, come on Cindy, and
21	MR. ENGELMANN: So you're cooperating
22	because he's
23	MR. LEROUX: Now he's starting to be a

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MR. ENGELMANN: All right. Any other

1	reasons why you're cooperating with him?
2	MR. LEROUX: Oh, what set me off in the
3	first place was suicide/murder. I said, "Jesus." I said
4	to him, "If I had found his body and I'd have been alone
5	there to find it " Oh, he said, they probably would
6	have arrested you for murder. I said, "Are you joking?" I
7	said, "He wasn't murdered it was a suicide." And he kind
8	of went like
9	MR. ENGELMANN: At some point he asks you
10	about whether you were sexually abused?
11	MR. LEROUX: He knew it. I think he knew
12	it.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: What, if anything, did you
14	think he could do about that?
15	MR. LEROUX: I thought and he told me, we're
16	going to kick in some doors down there. We're going to get
17	these guys arrested. We're going to investigate all this.
18	He said I'm going to get some help on this. I know and
19	we're going to bust them all. We're going to do this,
20	we're going to do that. I mean, he was just building me
21	right there.
22	He said I'll have those old guys thrown in
23	jail, and it's not a problem. I said wow, that's something
24	I've been trying to do since 1956, and he's going to do it.
25	He's going to do it.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: So he told you he would
2	MR. LEROUX: Oh yes.
3	MR. ENGELMANN:somehow get people
4	charged?
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes, and that's the first thing
6	I threw up to him the day he left here, the last thing I
7	threw up to him the day he left here. I mean he was
8	packing it in to go to B.C. there, auctioning off his
9	house, he was leaving. He said they're not arrested, and
10	he said I'll bet you they didn't even question them. He
11	says, you look into it, you and Nadeau, you look after
12	that.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Did he tell you whether or
14	not he was an active police officer with the Cornwall
15	Police in fall of 1996 or early '97?
16	MR. LEROUX: It leaked somehow. It wasn't
17	right away. I always thought he was a cop. Then I see him
18	with a badge. He's using it in the subways and that, and
19	Bourgeois says, that badge is useless. He says, yeah, but
20	it works here.
21	I say, you lost your job; is that correct?
22	He says, yeah, but I'm getting it back due to all this work
23	that we're doing. I'm going to get my job back. I have
24	kids too, and I have a wife too, and I'm going to get my
25	job back.

1	I can't do mine, but he can do his.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: Did your business suffer
3	during this period of time, sir?
4	MR. LEROUX: I lost everything. Stupid.
5	Lost everything.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: What did you lose?
7	MR. LEROUX: House.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: How so?
9	MR. LEROUX: I couldn't make the mortgage
10	payments. Losing contracts. Start a house and not finish
11	it. I left a lot of work undone down there. It's unreal.
12	I was sailing good. I was fine.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Why would you do that?
14	MR. LEROUX: My wife had pardon?
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Why would you give up your
16	work, job, your house?
17	MR. LEROUX: It come to a point where both
18	of us were falling apart. My wife was dying. Unknown to
19	me, she had an embolism the size of a golf ball in her
20	head.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, did you become aware of
22	that later in time? I understand she died in 2001.
23	MR. LEROUX: Yes, I buried her in 2001. She
24	was three-and-a-half months in a coma through all this.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: So back in 1996, you

1	weren't aware of that then?
2	MR. LEROUX: No, but she was having problems
3	with her balance.
4	MR. ENGELMANN: Sir, you have to speak into
5	the microphone.
6	THE COMMISSIONER: I guess the question is
7	you didn't know that then, so when did you lose everything?
8	MR. LEROUX: 1999 or 2000; that's why we
9	were living on 44 Pine Street in 1999.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay, so Mr. Leroux, you had
11	extensive dealings and contacts with Mr. Dunlop?
12	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: And some of his cohort, if I
14	can use the term?
15	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: Like Mr. Bourgeois and
17	others?
18	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
19	MR. ENGELMANN: In late 1996, early 1997
20	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: Did the contacts become less
22	frequent after that?
23	MR. LEROUX: They started to slow down, yes.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: And in fact you went to
25	Toronto on occasion to meet with him?

1	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
2	MR. ENGELMANN: And sir, did you ever did
3	he ever bring you to Toronto to meet other alleged victims
4	of sexual abuse?
5	MR. LEROUX: Yes, but I didn't know I was
6	going there to meet other victims.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: He didn't tell you that in
8	advance?
9	MR. LEROUX: No.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: Who, if anyone, do you
11	remember meeting in Toronto, through Mr. Dunlop?
12	MR. LEROUX: I was in my motel room and he
13	says I'm going to bring someone in, and then I'll take them
14	back out of the room again. Just have a look at him. You
15	can talk to him. You know, you can introduce yourself,
16	give them another name. I said okay. So he sends in D.S.
17	and
18	MR. ENGELMANN: David Silmser?
19	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: Had you ever met him before?
21	MR. LEROUX: Met him face to face?
22	MR. ENGELMANN: Yes.
23	MR. LEROUX: No. I just heard him; phone
24	calls and that.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Sure.

1	MR. LEROUX: Anyway getting back to
2	MR. ENGELMANN: I can't hear you, sir.
3	MR. LEROUX: You wanted to know -
4	You wanted to know what?
5	MR. ENGELMANN: I wanted to know if he
6	introduced you to other people?
7	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
8	MR. ENGELMANN: All right, and one of them
9	was D.S.
10	MR. LEROUX: Yes Renshaw?
11	MR. ENGELMANN: I'm sorry?
12	MR. LEROUX: Renshaw.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Which Renshaw?
14	MR. LEROUX: Both of them.
15	MR. ENGELMANN: Okay. They were also in
16	Toronto at some point?
17	MR. LEROUX: Yes. He had a bunch of
18	victims, I don't know them all I mean, they just like
19	he didn't left me one at a time.
20	See what he did was I met David and then
21	David left the room. He said you know who he is. I said
22	"Yes". He says "Who?" I said "Charles Manson".
23	MR. ENGELMANN: Why did you say that?
24	MR. LEROUX: Because that's what he looked
25	like. To me at the time, he looked like Charles Manson.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: You were just kidding at
2	the time?
3	MR. LEROUX: Oh, of course. That was just a
4	joke. I say "No", I said "That D.S." So he says "You want
5	to go out and drink with him?" I said "Where?" He says,
6	"Just take out just feel him out and see where he's
7	going; see what he knows; you want to play 20 questions
8	with him; get to know him".
9	So he gave us a driver and we went bar
10	hopping all over the place; Toronto. We did a few bars and
11	he was getting, like, smashed.
12	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Silsmer?
13	MR. LEROUX: Yes.
14	MR. ENGELMANN: What about yourself?
15	MR. LEROUX: I stayed away from him. He is
16	across the room and I'm watching him. He's going to hustle
17	some girls in there, and stuff like that, and
18	MR. ENGELMANN: All right. So you're just
19	paying for drinks?
20	MR. LEROUX: Yeah, I'm just pumping the
21	drinks to him. So anyway, at the end of the evening, a guy
22	picks us up around I think the last bar closed around,
23	like, 2 o'clock or 2:30.
24	We're standing in the parking lot waiting
25	for this guy to pick us up, and he says "I know what you're

1	doing," he says. "You're trying to get information from
2	me." I says "I didn't even I didn't talk to you all
3	evening. I didn't go around you. I don't want nothing to
4	do with you. I just don't like you." And that ended that.
5	We're back to the hotel and he says to
6	Dunlop, he says "I don't want to be around with that I
7	don't like that guy".
8	MR. ENGELMANN: Did you discuss anything
9	with Mr. Silmser dealing with Ken Seguin?
10	MR. LEROUX: Not a thing. Not a bloody
11	thing. He wouldn't talk. Hey, I mean, he just he
12	didn't like me.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: Was Mr. Dunlop did he ask
14	you to try and get some information from Mr. Silmser?
15	MR. LEROUX: "See what he knows."
16	MR. ENGELMANN: But you didn't ask?
17	MR. LEROUX: I couldn't get near the guy. I
18	think he wasn't stupid. He didn't want to have anything
19	to do with us.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: All right.
21	MR. LEROUX: He was a
22	THE COMMISSIONER: A drinker?
23	MR. LEROUX: just drink; just steady
24	drinking. And he could drink.
25	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Commissioner, I'm

1	looking at the time. I wonder if this is a good time I
2	don't think I'll be that much longer with Mr. Leroux.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: Fine, let's take the
4	lunch break then. Thank you.
5	THE REGISTRAR: Order; all rise. À l'ordre;

21	feeling well; and would like to spend some time
22	recuperating if he could and rest. He is certainly
23	available tomorrow morning and what I would propose, if it
24	suits you, is that we give him the afternoon to recover and
25	start with him first thing in the morning

1	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. I think in
2	the circumstances, that's all the best we can do.
3	So why don't we adjourn till 9:30 tomorrow
4	morning and then we'll proceed there or assess where we go
5	from there.
6	MR. ENGELMANN: Thank you.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you very much.
