3	THE REGISTRAR: Order. All rise. À l'ordre.
4	Veuillez vous lever.
5	This hearing of the Cornwall Public Inquiry
6	is now in session. The Honourable Mr. Justice Normand
7	Glaude, Commissioner, presiding.
8	Please be seated. Veuillez vous asseoir.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Good
10	afternoon, all. Mr. Stauffer.
11	MR. STAUFFER: Yes, good afternoon, Mr.
12	Commissioner.
13	We would like to call to the stand Carole
14	Hesse. Ms. Hesse is currently seated, so we're ready to
15	have her sworn. Thank you.
16	CAROLE HESSE: Sworn/Assermentée
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Good afternoon then, Ms.
18	Hesse.
19	MS. HESSE: Good afternoon.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: How are you doing today?
21	MS. HESSE: Good.
22	THE COMMISSIONER: Good.
23	So you're here and people are going to ask
24	you a bunch of questions. I'd like you to take your time
25	and answer in a nice clear voice to the best of your

1	ability. So that means if the lawyers ask questions that
2	you don't understand, don't be surprised, it's part of
3	their training to do that I guess. And so just ask them to
4	repeat and they'll change the question around.
5	If you don't know the answer, I don't want
6	you to guess. I'd rather you say, "I don't know the
7	answer".
8	MS. HESSE: Okay.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: And if there is anything
10	that bothers you or that just doesn't seem right, just look
11	over and tell me and we'll either take a break or we'll
12	explain things for you.
13	So there is water there. There is a mic
14	there is a speaker, a little box in front of you.
15	MS. HESSE: M'hm.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: That's a speaker. If you
17	have trouble hearing, you can turn it up or you can turn it
18	down.
19	Do you have any questions?
20	MS. HESSE: No.
21	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you very much.
22	EXAMINATION IN-CHIEF BY/INTERROGATOIRE EN-CHEF PAR MR.
23	STAUFFER:
24	MR. STAUFFER: Thank you, Mr. Commissioner.
25	Ms. Hesse, thank you for coming today.

1	Could you tell us when you were born?
2	MS. HESSE: June 4^{th} , 1958.
3	MR. STAUFFER: And where do you presently
4	live?
5	MS. HESSE: Williamstown, Ontario.
6	MR. STAUFFER: All right. I understand that
7	your maiden name was Renshaw. Is that correct?
8	MS. HESSE: Yes.
9	MR. STAUFFER: Now you have several
10	siblings. Could you just tell us how many brothers and
11	sisters you have?
12	MS. HESSE: I have four. I have brothers,
13	two half-sisters.
14	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And are the
15	brothers all younger than yourself or where are they?
16	MS. HESSE: Yes.
17	MR. STAUFFER: Now you were raised, I
18	understand, as a Roman Catholic or you were the only one
19	baptized as Roman Catholic, I guess that's the expression?
20	MS. HESSE: That's right.
21	MR. STAUFFER: But you were raised in the
22	United Church. Is that right?
23	MS. HESSE: Yes.
24	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And your father,
25	as I understand it, never remarried but as you tell us you

1	have two half-sisters by your mother?
2	MS. HESSE: Right.
3	MR. STAUFFER: Now you were considered I
4	guess the mother figure then in the family?
5	MS. HESSE: Once Mom left, yes.
6	MR. STAUFFER: Yes. And we're going to
7	deal, Ms. Hesse, with Mr. Ken Seguin. Could you tell us if
8	you knew Mr. Seguin?
9	MS. HESSE: Yes, I did.
10	MR. STAUFFER: In what context did you know
11	him?
12	MS. HESSE: In the beginning as the boy's
13	probation officer but then as time grew on, as a family
14	friend.
15	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. So he was the
16	probation officer for one of more of your brothers. Is
17	that right?
18	MS. HESSE: Yes.
19	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And as a family
20	friend then did you have occasion to visit him at his
21	place?
22	MS. HESSE: Yes.
23	MR. STAUFFER: Now, where would he have
24	started out in terms of his house when you first
25	MS. HESSE: On Riverdale.

1	MR. STAUFFER: In Riverdale, okay. And then
2	he moved at some point and where was that?
3	MS. HESSE: Down to Summerstown along the
4	water.
5	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Now, the
6	relationship with your brothers, I don't know how you can
7	describe it. I know that's a very general question and you
8	have several brothers, but how would you describe your
9	relationship with them over the years?
10	MS. HESSE: M'hm, for a number of years we
11	were very close until we moved to Cornwall and they became
12	involved with the correctional system of Cornwall and we
13	seemed to drift further and further apart.
14	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. How often, roughly,
15	would you have visited Mr. Seguin, Ken Seguin, at his house
16	in Riverdale?
17	MS. HESSE: In Riverdale, once.
18	MR. STAUFFER: And how often would you have
19	visited him in Summerstown?
20	MS. HESSE: Oh gosh, a lot.
21	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. And who was living
22	with Mr. Seguin, if anyone, in Summerstown?
23	MS. HESSE: My one brother did for a while.
24	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And how long was
25	that, do you know roughly?

1	MS. HESSE: Oh, approximately a year.
2	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. And so they lived
3	together.
4	I'm going to turn to the years when Mr.
5	Dunlop became involved in your life, Perry Dunlop. We have
6	it as being somewhere around 1995 or 1996.
7	Does that sound like the right time frame?
8	MS. HESSE: Yes.
9	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. How would you have
10	come to meet each other?
11	MS. HESSE: I'm not sure if I called him or
12	he called me, but we got together to talk about people I
13	knew that knew the boys, my brothers.
14	MR. STAUFFER: So did he come to your place
15	then where you living then at that time in Cornwall?
16	MS. HESSE: Yes.
17	MR. STAUFFER: And I've got it as being, you
18	were living on 12^{th} Street East at that time back in '95,
19	'96?
20	MS. HESSE: Yes.
21	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. When Mr. Dunlop came
22	to see you, just out of curiosity, was he in uniform or in
23	civilian clothes?
24	MS. HESSE: Civilian.
25	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Was he ever

1	accompanied by anyone else?
2	MS. HESSE: Yes.
3	MR. STAUFFER: Who was that, do you know?
4	MS. HESSE: It was Mr. MacDonald was with
5	him.
6	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Now this is not
7	Reverend Charles MacDonald, just to be clear, as we
8	understand it?
9	MS. HESSE: No, it's not.
10	MR. STAUFFER: Or it's not Mr. Malcolm
11	MacDonald?
12	MS. HESSE: No.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: Do you know which
14	MacDonald it was?
15	MS. HESSE: No, I forget who what his
16	first name was. I just know he was a young man about
17	Perry's age.
18	MR. STAUFFER: All right. I mean, my notes
19	say that he was a young, slim man, but that's about as much
20	as you can remember?
21	Did he have much involvement with you in
22	terms of asking you questions about anything?
23	MS. HESSE: No, he basically just sat there
24	and wrote notes. Perry and I were talking.
25	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And so when you

1	were speaking with Mr. Dunlop, what was the extent of your
2	conversations with him? Why was he there? What were you
3	talking about?
4	MS. HESSE: He was there because of the
5	abuse that had taken place and did I know what like, he
6	had some pictures that he wanted me to see and most of them
7	were of my brothers. Some were other people that my
8	brothers had hung around with or that I knew through my
9	brothers, and there were some pictures of Father Charlie.
10	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Do you remember, if
11	you can think back those 12 years or so ago, as to how the
12	photographs were produced to you.
13	That is, were they shown to you singly?
14	Were they in a collection? What do you remember?
15	MS. HESSE: No, he just had like a stack of
16	them in his hand and he just gave me one at a time.
17	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And is the first
18	time you were aware that someone had pictures of your
19	brothers, if I can put it that way, in this kind of a
20	context?
21	MS. HESSE: Yes.
22	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. What went through your
23	mind or how did you feel when Mr. Dunlop was showing you
24	these?
25	MS. HESSE: I was mortified.

1	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Had you any inkling at
2	all or any thought at all that your brothers might have
3	been involved in some kind of alleged abuse?
4	MS. HESSE: No, not until that day.
5	MR. STAUFFER: I know this is rough and if
6	you need to take a drink, go right ahead, okay?
7	In terms of the conversations then, were
8	they eventually reduced to writing. That is, did Mr.
9	Dunlop take a statement from you?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes, he did.
11	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. And, again, Mr.
12	Commissioner, we have a few statements but the one that I
13	believe Ms. Hesse is referring to would be Document Number
14	716608. It's a two-page document dated December 13 th , 1996.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. Thank you.
16	That will be Exhibit 714.
17	EXHIBIT NO./PIÈCE NO. 714:
18	(716608) Statement from Carole
19	Deschamps dated December 13, 1996
20	MR. STAUFFER: Thank you, sir.
21	Now, Ms. Hesse, if you could just take a
22	moment to look at that again. Is that your signature at
23	the end of the statement?
24	MS. HESSE: Yes, it is.
25	MR. STAUFFER: And do you know who would

1	have typed this statement?
2	MS. HESSE: Perry, I'm assuming.
3	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. You didn't type it
4	yourself?
5	MS. HESSE: No. I wrote out the first one,
6	signed it and then Perry brought me back the typed
7	statement.
8	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And I gather
9	there are some initials on the front page or the first
10	page. Do you recognize those initials?
11	MS. HESSE: Yes.
12	MR. STAUFFER: Whose are those?
13	MS. HESSE: Mine.
14	MR. STAUFFER: All right. So this statement
15	essentially reflects the conversations or the questions and
16	answers that you had with Mr. Dunlop back in 1996. Is that
17	right?
18	MS. HESSE: Yes.
19	MR. STAUFFER: You also gave another
20	statement. If we could go well, before we go there, did
21	you give any other statement to Mr. Dunlop, other than what
22	we've looked at here in this current exhibit?
23	MS. HESSE: I don't know if it was a
24	statement, but Perry and I often talked.
25	MR. STAUFFER: Right. I talk when I say

1	a statement, I mean something that's in writing, just so
2	we're clear.
3	But you and Mr. Dunlop then had further
4	conversation, did you, after this statement?
5	MS. HESSE: Yes.
6	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Again, would these be
7	in the context of him coming to your place and asking you
8	questions?
9	MS. HESSE: No, mostly I went to their
10	place.
11	MR. STAUFFER: All right. So you visited
12	Mr. Dunlop and his wife?
13	MS. HESSE: Yes.
14	MR. STAUFFER: And talked to them?
15	MS. HESSE: M'hm.
16	MR. STAUFFER: Okay, yes. Now, at some
17	point, you gave another statement, and I understand this
18	was given to a member of the Ontario Provincial Police?
19	MS. HESSE: Yes.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, before we go any
21	further
22	MR. STAUFFER: Yes, sir.
23	THE COMMISSIONER: Could you look at page 2?
24	MR. STAUFFER: Yes, sir.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Not, not on the public

1	screens there. Is there a name in there that should be
2	protected?
3	MS. HESSE: Yes.
4	MR. STAUFFER: Yes. So Mr. Commissioner has
5	pointed out something which we have overlooked, and that's
6	quite important. So this we will not show the second
7	page of this document on camera.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: So it should have this
9	person has a moniker, does he not?
10	MR. STAUFFER: Yes, sir.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. So we are
12	just going to put a ban on publication on that document, I
13	think, Madam Clerk. Is that all right?
14	MR. STAUFFER: Yes. Thank you sir.
15	So Mrs. Hesse are there any other
16	comments, Mr. Commissioner, about this particular statement
17	before we move on?
18	THE COMMISSIONER: I haven't finished
19	reading it, but no. Go ahead.
20	MR. STAUFFER: Thank you.
21	Mrs. Hesse, we are now dealing with what is
22	called an interview report, which is document 111345. This
23	is an interview that appears to have taken place April $21^{ m st}$,
24	1998, so about a year-and-a-half after the statement you
25	gave to Mr. Dunlop?

1	MS. HESSE: Okay.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Exhibit number 715.
3	EXHIBIT NO./PIÈCE NO P-715:
4	(111345) Interview Report - Carole
5	Hesse w/ OPP S.T. Seguin dated April
6	21, 1998
7	MR. STAUFFER: And, again, in this case, I
8	gather this statement was taken over the telephone. Is
9	that right?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. STAUFFER: And so clearly, you didn't
12	have a chance to sign anything or did you sign some
13	statement to the OPP?
14	MS. HESSE: No.
15	MR. STAUFFER: No. So Mr give me one
16	moment here Mr. Seguin, Detective Constable Seguin would
17	have been the fellow on the phone it would appear?
18	MS. HESSE: Yes.
19	MR. STAUFFER: I gather he identified
20	himself as an OPP officer when he called you
21	MS. HESSE: Yes.
22	MR. STAUFFER: and asked you for your
23	statement. Just out of curiosity, did he give you some
24	idea of how he'd gotten your name?
25	MS. HESSE: I believe he said he had talked

1	to the boys.
2	MR. STAUFFER: To your brothers?
3	MS. HESSE: To my brothers.
4	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And so they
5	tracked you down, because at this point you are living up
6	north in Hay River, as I understand it?
7	MS. HESSE: Yes.
8	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Did Constable
9	Seguin indicate what he was doing? Why was he calling you?
10	MS. HESSE: He was doing an investigation
11	into the alleged abuse of my brothers and wanted to know
12	what I knew about it.
13	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Again, this statement
14	basically captures that knowledge; what you knew about your
15	brothers. Did any of your brothers ever talk to you up to
16	that time, up to 1998? Did they tell you what had happened
17	to them?
18	MS. HESSE: Not really, no.
19	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. How were you getting
20	your information then?
21	MS. HESSE: Just when Perry had showed me
22	the pictures, it was like a slap in the face, it's like
23	reality check. "Oh! My God! My brothers are victims."
24	MR. STAUFFER: Okay.
25	MS. HESSE: And then I had talked to them

1	briefly and said, "Why didn't you tell me what was
2	happening?"
3	MR. STAUFFER: Okay.
4	MS. HESSE: "We could have done something."
5	And it was just leave it alone. They didn't want to talk
6	about it. They didn't want to be a victim.
7	MR. STAUFFER: Okay.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: And 715 will be also
9	marked as with a publication ban.
10	MR. STAUFFER: Yes, sir. Thank you.
11	Now, Mrs. Hesse, did you give any other
12	statement? We have I'm going back in time a little bit
13	here, I possibly should have done this one first in
14	chronological order, but there is an earlier handwritten,
15	what appears to be, question and answer document 728950.
16	MS. HESSE: The handwritten one is the one
17	Perry and I did, I believe.
18	MR. STAUFFER: Yes.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Exhibit 716.
20	MR. STAUFFER: Yes, sir.
21	EXHIBIT NO./PIÈCE NO P-716:
22	(728950) Handwritten questions and
23	answers - Carole Hesse w/ Perry Dunlop
24	dated June 24, 1996
25	MR. STAUFFER: I'm just scanning this

1	briefly, Mr. Commissioner, to see if this also needs to be
2	banned from publication. No, I don't see any names which
3	are subject to a publication ban right now.
4	But, Mrs. Hesse, in terms of this statement
5	then, this is something that Mr. Dunlop wrote out. Is that
6	right?
7	MS. HESSE: Him and I, yes.
8	MR. STAUFFER: Pardon me?
9	MS. HESSE: Him and I.
10	MR. STAUFFER: Yes. So is any of this your
11	handwriting? Just take your time.
12	MS. HESSE: Just my signature.
13	MR. STAUFFER: Yes. And I gather I don't
14	know if you can tell us this or not, but where it says,
15	"Witness" at the end of the statement, is that Mr. Dunlop's
16	or do you know?
17	MS. HESSE: I don't know, but I'm assuming
18	it is.
19	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Would this have been
20	something that would have been done right in your presence
21	or did Mr. Dunlop bring it over to you after a
22	conversation?
23	MS. HESSE: No, we did it
24	MR. STAUFFER: Right, face-to-face?
25	MS. HESSE: right then.

1	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. So that's June 24 th ,
2	1996.
3	And then, as far as you know, and I know
4	it's all a long time ago, but are there any other
5	statements that you can recall having given that became a
6	written document?
7	MS. HESSE: Not that I'm aware of, but
8	maybe.
9	MR. STAUFFER: Okay, fair enough.
10	Now, I just have a few more questions in
11	terms of Mr. Dunlop. When then would you have last had
12	contact with him? Do you have some recollection of when
13	you last spoke with him?
14	MS. HESSE: The last time I spoke with Perry
15	was when Helen and him put the house on the market and they
16	were planning on leaving.
17	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. So this would be
18	sometime in the latter part of the last century; sometime
19	in 1999 or something like that, or 2000?
20	MS. HESSE: Yeah, I was down for a visit
21	from the Territories, and I went to see Perry and Helen.
22	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Just out of curiosity,
23	what were you doing up in the Territories when you were
24	living up in Hay River?
25	MS. HESSE: I was a Correctional Officer.

1	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. And what age group
2	would you have dealt with as a Correctional Officer in the
3	Territories?
4	MS. HESSE: I started off with medium
5	security male, adult male; moved over to young offenders
6	and back to the male population.
7	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Now, I am going to ask
8	you about Malcolm MacDonald for a moment. Tell me, Madam,
9	if you could, did you know him?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. STAUFFER: And when would you have met
12	him?
13	MS. HESSE: I met him when one of my
14	brothers I can't remember which one first got into
15	trouble. He became their lawyer.
16	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And so would you
17	have had a fairly long experience with him or was it just
18	the one visit?
19	MS. HESSE: Oh, gosh, no; a lot of years.
20	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Mr. Malcolm
21	MacDonald, did you see him outside of his office?
22	MS. HESSE: Oh, yes.
23	MR. STAUFFER: Where would you have seen
24	him?
25	MS. HESSE: Actually, I've gone to breakfast

1	with him and Ken a couple of times, and I've seen him a lot
2	of times at Ken's residence in Summerstown.
3	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Just dealing with
4	Mr. Malcolm MacDonald for a moment further, at some point
5	did you contact him to try to obtain one of your brothers'
6	files?
7	MS. HESSE: Yes.
8	MR. STAUFFER: And can you tell the
9	Commissioner about that, without naming names, what were
10	you trying to do?
11	MS. HESSE: My brother had wrote out I
12	called it his book about the abuse he had suffered. He
13	had given it to his lawyer to give to whoever, the board or
14	whatever, that was dealing with that abuse.
15	MR. STAUFFER: Now, if I can just stop you
16	there.
17	MS. HESSE: M'hm.
18	MR. STAUFFER: Where was your brother saying
19	this abuse had occurred?
20	MS. HESSE: Alfred.
21	MR. STAUFFER: At the Alfred training
22	school, all right.
23	MS. HESSE: Then he was incarcerated at the
24	time and I had Power of Attorney. We wanted that story.
25	C-15 wanted it. So he asked me to go and get it from

1	Malcolm.
2	So I had called the receptionist numerous
3	times. "Can I please get C-15's file?" "Can't find it."
4	That was the response I was given, or "Can you give us a
5	couple of days?" or "It's in the vault" or so I asked to
6	speak to Mr. MacDonald.
7	MR. STAUFFER: Okay.
8	MS. HESSE: And more than once he wasn't
9	available. He was busy with a client, or he's in court or
10	I just wasn't allowed to speak to him.
11	I pursued this for almost a year. "I want
12	this file. I want C-15's whole file; my brother's whole
13	file." "Why would you want your brother's file?" "Well,
14	obviously because you are not doing your job as his lawyer.
15	I want the whole file." "Oh well."
16	MR. STAUFFER: Did you ever get the file?
17	MS. HESSE: I never did get it. I told Mr.
18	MacDonald that I would be going to the Law Society about
19	this, which I did, and I never heard back from them either.
20	MR. STAUFFER: M'hm. Okay. So to this day,
21	that file's never come into your hands or any of the family
22	members' hands?
23	MS. HESSE: Nobody has ever seen that file.
24	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Now, I am going to
25	talk briefly about Father Charles MacDonald. Did you know

1	nim at all before these proceedings started?
2	MS. HESSE: Oh yeah, definitely.
3	MR. STAUFFER: And how did you know him?
4	MS. HESSE: Through Ken.
5	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Can you give us
6	some example of what you are talking about there?
7	MS. HESSE: I had met him several times at
8	Ken's home, the home in Summerstown because I was only
9	at the house in Riverdale once, but his home in
10	Summerstown, I was probably there quite often.
11	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Just take a
12	moment here. Do you want water? Are you all right?
13	So, Mrs. Hesse, had you ever attended church
14	when Father MacDonald was presiding? Was he your priest,
15	if I can put it that way?
16	MS. HESSE: No, he was not.
17	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Now with respect
18	to seeing Father MacDonald, did you see him with anyone
19	other than Mr. Seguin?
20	MS. HESSE: Yes.
21	MR. STAUFFER: Who would that have been?
22	MS. HESSE: Claude Shaver.
23	MR. STAUFFER: All right. Now, can you help
24	the Commissioner out as best you can as to the year when
25	you saw Mr. Shaver with Mr. Seguin?

1	MS. HESSE: Well, I actually seen him twice.
2	MR. STAUFFER: All right.
3	MS. HESSE: Both at Ken's home and it would
4	be the summer after Ken bought the house in Summerstown.
5	MR. STAUFFER: All right. And can you
6	describe the first time you met him then. How did you know
7	who he was and so on?
8	MS. HESSE: Ken introduced us.
9	MR. STAUFFER: Okay.
10	MS. HESSE: I was leaving Ken's home. Mr.
11	Shaver had pulled up behind my car and I couldn't get out,
12	so Ken asked him to move the car so I could leave.
13	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. And did you know who
14	he was when you first saw him, you know, the first time
15	_
16	MS. HESSE: Didn't have a clue.
17	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. Then the second time,
18	when would that have been? Is it the same year or is it
19	another year?
20	MS. HESSE: Oh, yes, it was shortly after
21	that. I had gone back down to Ken's and I was at the back
22	door actually, and you can see into the house from the back
23	door and Charlie and Claude were or, sorry, Malcolm and
24	Claude were at the dining room table. They were standing,
25	like behind the couch.

1	MR. STAUFFER: Okay. So just that so I
2	have it clear then, your recollection is you saw Ken
3	sorry, you saw Malcolm MacDonald and you saw Father Charles
4	MacDonald at Mr. Ken Seguin's house on this occasion?
5	MS. HESSE: No. Claude Shaver and
6	MR. STAUFFER: Who did I say? Sorry. Yes?
7	MS. HESSE: And Malcolm.
8	MR. STAUFFER: Okay, I apologize. Right. I
9	misstated it.
10	So you saw Mr. Shaver and Malcolm MacDonald
11	through the window at Mr. Seguin's house, yeah.
12	Now Mr. Shaver, did you have any other
13	contact with him other than those two occasions?
14	MS. HESSE: Not that I am aware of.
15	MR. STAUFFER: All right. I am just
16	wondering in terms of if we could take a minute here, if
17	you can tell us the impact that all of this has had on you,
18	I guess, for the last 12 or so years since you first had
19	some revelations to you from Mr. Dunlop. What's it been
20	like?
21	MS. HESSE: It's been hell. It's torn our
22	family apart. At one time we were very close. I remember
23	going to school and beating up C-15 and Gerry because they
24	wouldn't quit calling me mom. Now, we don't talk, or if we
25	do it's very strained and they live their life, I live

1	mine.
2	MR. STAUFFER: And, Mrs. Hesse, do you have
3	any recommendations that you would like to give to the
4	Commissioner?
5	MS. HESSE: Yes, and I think the one of
6	them would be that it any pedophile should be more
7	severely dealt with in the criminal system to ensure that
8	there is a speedy trial, whether it means that there's
9	several charges at instead of accumulating them.
10	That for young offenders in particular that
11	there would be no one-on-one with lawyers or probation
12	officers; that it would be actually a board to deal with
13	young offenders.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry, you mean in
15	conducting their defence?
16	MS. HESSE: Yeah. In conducting their
17	defence and their after-care.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Oh, the after-care I can
19	see, but for the defence, I mean it's a solicitor client
20	kind of situation.
21	MS. HESSE: But with young offenders, maybe
22	it shouldn't be.
23	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
24	MS. HESSE: Because then there wouldn't be
25	an opportunity for a one-on-one situation as there has been

1	and, hence, why we are here today.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
3	MR. STAUFFER: If I could ask you this, just
4	arising out of those comments.
5	How do you feel if the lawyer and we're
6	assuming it's a male lawyer here how are you do you
7	feel if there was a rule, to put it strongly, that someone
8	be in the room with the young offender/client at the same
9	time, and I am talking about somebody from that lawyer's
10	office, could that help or are you not for having
11	MS. HESSE: I don't think from the office.
12	MR. STAUFFER: Pardon me?
13	MS. HESSE: I don't believe it should be
14	someone from the lawyer's office.
15	MR. STAUFFER: All right.
16	MS. HESSE: Only because of the experience
17	I've had with Malcolm's receptionist and Malcolm. Your
18	staff can kind of fluff-up a lot of stuff so if it's
19	someone independent that would be present with the child,
20	there is a lot less chance of anything happening.
21	MR. STAUFFER: All right.
22	Well, Mr. Commissioner, those are the
23	questions that I have for Mrs. Hesse. Thank you very much.
24	So please stay there unless you need a break
25	and one of my friends may have some questions.

1	Thank you.
2	MS. HESSE: Thank you.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Manson
4	MR. MANSON: Yes, Mr. Commissioner. I am a
5	bit surprised to be up here as quickly as I am. Can I have
6	one second?
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Absolutely. Absolutely.
8	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
9	MR. MANSON: Mr. Commissioner, perhaps I
10	could ask the clerk to put up a document that was on our
11	Rule 38 notice just so that I could have a quick look at
12	it.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
14	MR. MANSON: It's number 716191.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Do you wish to file it as
16	an exhibit or just want to look at it for a minute?
17	MR. MANSON: I just want to look at it for a
18	second, Mr. Commissioner.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: It is an exhibit.
20	MR. MANSON: No, I don't need it, thank you.
21	I don't need it now, I just needed it to refresh my memory
22	as to what it was.
23	CROSS-EXAMINATION BY/CONTRE-INTERROGATOIRE PAR MR.
24	MANSON:
25	MR. MANSON: Ms. Hesse, I understand that

1	you are a bit unclear whether you first met with Mr. Dunlop
2	about this matter in '95 and '96, but my friend showed you
3	those handwritten notes that we just marked Exhibit 716?
4	MS. HESSE: Yes.
5	MR. MANSON: And they are dated June $24^{\rm th}$,
6	'96; correct?
7	MS. HESSE: Correct.
8	MR. MANSON: But my friend showed you those
9	handwritten notes that we just marked Exhibit 716?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. MANSON: And they are dated June $24^{\rm th}$,
12	'96; correct?
13	MS. HESSE: Correct.
14	MR. MANSON: And does that ring a bell?
15	Does that remind you that that was your first meeting with
16	Perry Dunlop to discuss this matter?
17	MS. HESSE: Yes.
18	MR. MANSON: Now, I take it the conversation
19	was much longer than what appears in these questions and
20	answers; correct?
21	MS. HESSE: Correct.
22	MR. MANSON: How did he explain to you why
23	he wanted to meet with you? Can you recall?
24	MS. HESSE: I don't remember exactly what he
25	said, but he told me that he was a Cornwall Police officer

1	and he was doing an investigation and there may be some
2	information that I may have that he would like to talk to
3	me about.
4	MR. MANSON: Do you recall if he told you
5	that he had commenced a lawsuit against various agencies
6	and officials?
7	MS. HESSE: No.
8	MR. MANSON: Are you saying you don't recall
9	or he didn't tell you?
10	MS. HESSE: He didn't tell me.
11	MR. MANSON: And you told us that he had a
12	stack of pictures with him?
13	MS. HESSE: Yes.
14	MR. MANSON: I know this is a long while ago
15	but can you recall how many there may have been?
16	MS. HESSE: Probably about 20, 25 pictures,
17	something like that. There was quite a few.
18	MR. MANSON: And a number of them were of
19	your brothers; correct?
20	MS. HESSE: Yes.
21	MR. MANSON: And a number of them were of
22	other young people who were friends of your brothers?
23	MS. HESSE: Not so young people. There was
24	pictures of Father Charlie
25	MR. MANSON: Well, I want to get to

1	MS. HESSE: Yeah.
2	MR. MANSON: I just want to divide it up
3	between young people and adults.
4	MS. HESSE: Yes.
5	MR. MANSON: So we have your brothers?
6	MS. HESSE: M'hm, yes.
7	MR. MANSON: And then we have some other
8	young people?
9	MS. HESSE: Yes.
10	MR. MANSON: And then there was some other
11	photographs of adult males?
12	MS. HESSE: Yes.
13	MR. MANSON: Were they all males? Can you
14	recall?
15	MS. HESSE: No. There was a picture with my
16	brother and my sister-in-law and there was some other
17	people that were there that were female, but I didn't know
18	them.
19	MR. MANSON: The picture of Father Charles,
20	was it a single picture?
21	MS. HESSE: There was two single pictures
22	and then there was some with my brothers in them.
23	MR. MANSON: Were there other adult males in
24	single pictures that you can recall?
25	MS. HESSE: Ken.

1	MR. MANSON: Ken Ken Seguin you mean?
2	MS. HESSE: Ken Seguin.
3	MR. MANSON: Yes.
4	MS. HESSE: Adult males? Not that I can
5	remember.
6	MR. MANSON: So using your best memory,
7	other than Father Charles and Ken Seguin, there weren't any
8	other adult males in the stack of pictures at that time?
9	MS. HESSE: Not at that time.
10	MR. MANSON: And then Mr. Stauffer showed
11	you some notes of an interview, or statement rather. We
12	made it Exhibit 714. It was dated December 13 th , 1996?
13	MS. HESSE: Yes.
14	MR. MANSON: And that's the one that you
15	signed and initialled at the bottom of the first page;
16	correct?
17	MS. HESSE: Yes.
18	MR. MANSON: Did you have contact with Mr.
19	Dunlop between those two statements?
20	MS. HESSE: Probably.
21	MR. MANSON: And that contact, would it have
22	been in person or over the phone?
23	MS. HESSE: In person I believe. There may
24	have been phone calls back and forth. I became very good
25	friends with Helen and Perry.

1	MR. MANSON: I think those are all my
2	questions, Mrs. Hesse. Thank you.
3	MS. HESSE: Thank you.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
5	Mr. Paul?
6	CROSS-EXAMINATION BY/CONTRE-INTERROGATOIRE PAR MR.
7	PAUL:
8	MR. PAUL: Ms. Hesse, I just have a few
9	questions at the beginning about
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Hang on. If you could
11	start by introducing yourself, sir?
12	MR. PAUL: Oh, sorry. My name is Ian Paul.
13	I appear
14	MR. MANSON: I apologize, Mr. Commissioner.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
16	MR. MANSON: I neglected to introduce myself
17	as well. If I could just Mrs. Hesse, my name is Allan
18	Manson. I represent the Citizens for Community Renewal,
19	which is a group of Cornwall citizens concerned about
20	public institutions and the protection of children. I
21	apologize for not introducing myself, and I thank you for
22	your testimony.
23	MS. HESSE: Thank you.
24	MR. PAUL: My name is Ian Paul. I appear as
25	one of the counsel for the Coalition for Action and I'd

1	like to ask you a few questions at the outset about how
2	many times, or the extent of your knowledge, of some of the
3	persons you've mentioned.
4	First of all, Malcolm MacDonald. I think
5	you said you had extensive contact with him?
6	MS. HESSE: Yes.
7	MR. PAUL: Would that be in the dozens of
8	times that you'd seen him?
9	MS. HESSE: Probably more than a dozen
10	times. I have four brothers, all of which were Malcolm's
11	clients.
12	MR. PAUL: And some of these would have been
13	meeting at his office or at the court with the brother
14	with a brother?
15	MS. HESSE: Yes.
16	MR. PAUL: And some of these meetings would
17	have been maybe as long as half-an-hour, an hour or more?
18	MS. HESSE: Yes.
19	MR. PAUL: So in terms of Malcolm MacDonald,
20	you think of him as someone that you could easily identify
21	without any difficulty?
22	MS. HESSE: Yes.
23	MR. PAUL: All right. Now, with respect to
24	Father Charlie, is he on the same scale or is he someone
25	you wouldn't have seen as much as Malcolm?

1	MS. HESSE: Oh, never as much as Malcolm.
2	MR. PAUL: Okay. How many times would you
3	have actually seen Father Charlie?
4	MS. HESSE: Five, six.
5	MR. PAUL: And these would all have been
6	with Ken Seguin?
7	MS. HESSE: Yes.
8	MR. PAUL: And in terms of the length of
9	time of the contact, are we talking about minutes or more
10	than that, half-an-hour, an hour?
11	MS. HESSE: A few times it was just "Hi" and
12	a couple of times we actually like a bunch of us would
13	sit down and have coffee or whatever at Ken's.
14	MR. PAUL: So most of those occasions would
15	have been at Ken Seguin's residence?
16	MS. HESSE: Yes.
17	MR. PAUL: Now, with respect to Mr. Shaver,
18	I think you mentioned two times that you had contact with
19	him at Ken Seguin's residence?
20	MS. HESSE: Right.
21	MR. PAUL: And both of those short contacts?
22	MS. HESSE: Very short.
23	MR. PAUL: So there's no sitting down and
24	meeting pretty late?
25	MS. HESSE: No.

1	MR. PAUL: Now, when you first meet him, you
2	didn't have any idea initially who he was?
3	MS. HESSE: No.
4	MR. PAUL: Now, as far as why he stands out
5	in your mind, did you become familiar with the fact that he
6	was an official in the police department at some point?
7	MS. HESSE: When we were introduced, Ken
8	asked me if I was born under a rock because I didn't know
9	who he was. I had no idea.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Can we go over how
11	exactly you were introduced?
12	MS. HESSE: He was getting he had pulled
13	in behind me.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: Right.
15	MS. HESSE: I was leaving with Ken not
16	with Ken but Ken was walking me out to my car when Claude
17	pulled in the driveway. Claude got out of his car, stood -
18	- like he was still holding the car door and Ken said,
19	"Carole, this is Claude Shaver. Claude, this is" at
20	that time, I was Deschamps, Gerry's sister.
21	THE COMMISSIONER: Shook hands and
22	everything or?
23	MS. HESSE: No.
24	THE COMMISSIONER: No.
25	MS. HESSE: No, I just you know, I waved

1	and then I thought okay, Ken does a lot of work outside of
2	his office because that's what I assumed it was all
3	happening.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
5	MS. HESSE: You know, I'd seen Malcolm there
6	several times. Now I had seen the chief of police. I just
7	assumed it was work related.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. But we're back to
9	you said "Hi" like that.
10	MS. HESSE: Yeah.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: Then what happened?
12	MS. HESSE: Then Ken asked Claude if he'd
13	move his car so that I could get my car out.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
15	MS. HESSE: He said, "Yeah, not a problem".
16	He got in his car as I backed out. I waved bye to Ken,
17	said, "Talk to you later", waved to Claude. He waved back
18	and I left.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. But was there a
20	discussion about being under a stone at that point?
21	MS. HESSE: When Ken introduces, I said,
22	"Claude? Who is Claude?" And he said, "Were you born
23	under a rock? It's Claude Shaver, the Chief of Police."
24	And he looked at me like I was "duh" and I thought after,
25	yeah, he must have thought I was "duh". Like how could I

1	not know the chief of police when we live in such a small
2	community, but I had never dealt with Claude. I never had
3	any contact with Claude before that.
4	MR. PAUL: And I take it that that would be
5	why it would stand out in your mind the fact that you were
6	introduced to him as the chief of police?
7	MS. HESSE: Yes.
8	MR. PAUL: Okay. Now, other than meeting
9	him and seeing him there, did you ever see a photograph of
10	him in a newspaper or something else that would confirm
11	that that was the chief of police?
12	MS. HESSE: Much later. My family had sent
13	me newspaper clippings from Cornwall when I lived in the
14	Territories but and I believe he was in one of those
15	newspaper clippings but that was it.
16	MR. PAUL: And did that appear to be the
17	same person that you saw?
18	MS. HESSE: Yes.
19	MR. PAUL: You did indicate that you were
20	introduced as Gerry's brother?
21	MS. HESSE: No, I was Gerry's sister.
22	MR. PAUL: Sorry, Gerry's sister. Now, when
23	you were introduced to him, so Gerry was the one that was
24	living there with
25	

MS. HESSE: With Ken.

1	MR. PAUL: Yes, okay. And at that time was
2	Gerry do you know if he was on probation or not?
3	MS. HESSE: I don't believe so, but he may
4	have been because there wasn't a long period of time in
5	between for a while. So he may have been.
6	MR. PAUL: And when you introduced in
7	relation to Gerry was there any reaction from the chief
8	of police as to whether he seemed to recognize who Gerry
9	was or did he comment on it?
10	MS. HESSE: Didn't seem to fizz on him.
11	It's like
12	MR. PAUL: Okay. Are you familiar with
13	whether your brother's ever had any contact with Mr. Shaver
14	in the course of his police duties?
15	MS. HESSE: I don't know.
16	MR. PAUL: Now, as far as your brothers
17	attending Mr. Seguin's residence, I want to understand, you
18	were familiar with Mr. Seguin being their probation
19	officer; correct?
20	MS. HESSE: Yes.
21	MR. PAUL: Now, while he was their probation
22	officer, are you aware whether your brothers ever attended
23	his residence while they're on probation?
24	MS. HESSE: Oh, yes, definitely.
25	MR. PAUL: And for what reason? Did you

1	ever become aware why they would be doing that while they
2	were on probation?
3	MS. HESSE: Ken would lend them money if
4	they needed gas money. He had lent Gerry money for a car
5	stereo at one point. They'd party at Ken's.
6	MR. PAUL: Is this while they were on
7	probation?
8	MS. HESSE: Yes. Not always but often.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: Did you know this was
10	going on at the time?
11	MS. HESSE: The abuse?
12	THE COMMISSIONER: No, no. The parties at
13	Seguin's?
14	MS. HESSE: Yeah, I knew about the parties.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
16	MS. HESSE: They had also and I a
17	bunch of boys, young men because they were all young men at
18	this point when Ken had bought the house, but they had a
19	big boathouse rebuilding party, and it was just mostly
20	just the guys, and they were all down there. Ken's
21	boathouse, apparently, was falling into the river and they
22	were all there jacking it up and rebuilding it. But like I
23	said to Gerry, "Oh, great, I'll bring up the wieners." And
24	he said, "It's just the guys". So like I was kind of told,
25	"Don't bother coming, it's a guy thing".

1	MR. PAUL: So it appeared to you that your
2	brothers were, in effect, socialising with Mr. Seguin while
3	they were on probation?
4	MS. HESSE: Yes.
5	MR. PAUL: Apart from Mr. Seguin, are you
6	aware of any other probation officers or persons in
7	authority who were aware of that situation?
8	MS. HESSE: One of my brothers had another
9	gentleman from that office for a short period of time
10	because, I believe, Ken was on holidays. But as soon as
11	Ken came back, Ken was given back to or they were the
12	file was handed back over to Ken. So I'm not sure, like,
13	who would be aware of it.
14	MR. PAUL: But in terms of the socialising,
15	did you actually see this or did you hear about it from
16	your brothers?
17	MS. HESSE: I seen a lot of it but I and
18	then the boys would tell me.
19	MR. PAUL: All right. In terms of seeing
20	it, is that would you go to pick them up at the
21	residence or something of that nature?
22	MS. HESSE: No. A couple of times I partied
23	with them.
24	MR. PAUL: All right. And is there alcohol
25	involved?

1	MS. HESSE: There was sometimes. Not always
2	but there was. I mean, if you wanted a beer, you knew
3	where the fridge was, you went and got it.
4	MR. PAUL: Okay. Did that go for your
5	brothers as well, it was open for them to have alcohol?
6	MS. HESSE: Oh, certainly.
7	MR. PAUL: Do you recall what age they would
8	have been at that time while they're on probation, that
9	you're talking about?
10	MS. HESSE: At the time in Summerstown
11	because I don't know what happened in Riverdale. They
12	would have been in their teens. Some of it was before my
13	Dad died and Gerry was only 15 when Dad died so it would
14	have been before the youngest boy was 15 years of age.
15	MR. PAUL: I believe those are my questions,
16	Mr. Commissioner. Thank you.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
18	MS. HESSE: You're welcome.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Lee, is this your
20	client? No? Okay.
21	CROSS-EXAMINATION BY/CONTRE-INTERROGATOIRE PAR MR. LEE:
22	MR. LEE: Good afternoon, Ms. Hesse. My
23	name is Dallas Lee, I'm counsel for the Victims Group.
24	That group includes your brothers Gerry and Bob, both of
25	whom have testified here. I don't have very much with you

1	but I'd like to ask you a few questions.
2	MS. HESSE: Certainly.
3	MR. LEE: You've told us that you met Ken
4	Seguin when your brothers went on probation with him. Is
5	that correct?
6	MS. HESSE: Yes.
7	MR. LEE: You didn't know him before that at
8	all?
9	MS. HESSE: No.
10	MR. LEE: Can I assume that at the start of
11	that relationship, it was solely as a probation officer and
12	a concerned sibling of his probationers?
13	MS. HESSE: Yes.
14	MR. LEE: And eventually developed into a
15	friendship. Is that right?
16	MS. HESSE: Yes.
17	MR. LEE: You mentioned I think the words
18	you used were that at one point you considered him a family
19	friend?
20	MS. HESSE: Yes.
21	MR. LEE: Why do you say that? Who all
22	was he friends with your father?
23	MS. HESSE: Yes. I mean, he could come and
24	get the boys, take them fishing, chit-chat with Dad. My
25	half-sister and I had would go and have breakfast with

Ken and -- at different places.

2	So like it wasn't just he wasn't just
3	known to the boys on a professional basis. Like, it was
4	like, "Oh, hi, Ken. Do you want to do breakfast tomorrow,
5	or do you want to do dinner?"
6	My ex-husband and him often drank together.
7	One particular occasion, I guess our car got the flat tire
8	and Ken was out changing the tire because my ex-husband was
9	too drunk to take the lug nuts off. So like it was he
10	wasn't just as a professional person, he was more like,
11	"oh, Ken". I had a confidence in him, like I would my
12	brothers.
13	MR. LEE: And he knew the whole family?
14	MS. HESSE: Oh, definitely.
15	MR. LEE: Were you concerned the evidence
16	we've heard here is that your brother Gerry moved in with
17	Seguin in Summerstown in early 1989. Did you have any
18	concerns at that time about Gerry moving in with him?
19	MS. HESSE: Not at first. But then I went
20	down to visit shortly after Gerry moved in and Gerry was
21	showing me the house and what they had what Ken had
22	done. And Ken's family had come and planted flowers that
23	were in the Riverdale residence into the new place.
24	And when we went upstairs, Gerry was showing
25	me the two bedrooms that were in the house. And if you

knew my brother, he's a slob, he doesn't know how to make a bed. And I commented about it, "Gerry, how come your bed's made? Like, what, did you fall on your head?" And he went really red and left the room rapidly. And then showed me the bathroom and then we went into Ken's room. And I said, "This isn't Ken's room". Like, the bed was messed, the gym equipment was all over, like, Ken was meticulate (sic) in things that went on. He was ---

MR. LEE: Very neat, very tidy?

MS. HESSE: Very neat, very tidy. And I said to Gerry, "What's going on", like, and he -- I said, "Is something happening here?" And, "Shut up. You don't know what you're talking about. We're not supposed to be in Ken's room anyway."

And then he took me out onto the upstairs deck, showed me, like, how they could see the big ships and things because Ken had a very large telescope. And they could see, like, further into the river with the telescope and the different ships going through and stuff. And then it was a very short -- and when we got downstairs, Gerry and I both left.

MR. LEE: The question I had asked before you told that story was whether or not you had any problem with Gerry moving in, and you said, "Not at first," and you told that story. So what did you take out of that

1	experience? Was that somehow concerning to you?
2	MS. HESSE: It was, because I knew Ken was
3	gay. I'd known all along.
4	MR. LEE: How did you know that?
5	MS. HESSE: Ken told me.
6	MR. LEE: Do you remember when? How early
7	on in
8	MS. HESSE: Oh, gosh, that was right in the
9	very beginning because I used to tease Ken and anyone that
10	knows me knows I'm very blunt, very open, and if I have
11	something to say I usually say it. And sometimes I
12	shouldn't but I do.
13	And we were out having dinner one evening
14	and I said, "Ken, like, why aren't you ever with women?
15	When are you ever going to get married? Like, this is
16	B.S." Actually, I didn't say B.S., I said the whole word.
17	I said, "You're a good looking man, you got a good career,
18	like, go and find somebody". And he started to laugh and
19	he said, "Carole, I'm gay. I don't want to be with a
20	woman." And I "Oh, boy".
21	MR. LEE: Was
22	MS. HESSE: I was opening up a kettle of
23	fish.
24	MR. LEE: How early on in your relationship
25	with Ken would you would he have had told you that?

1	MS. HESSE: Quite early. Like, he was very
2	open about it.
3	MR. LEE: Did you ever have any discussions
4	with Ken about his relationships? I mean, he's told you
5	he's gay. Does it go any further than that? Is he talking
6	about his sex life, dating, anything along those lines?
7	MS. HESSE: Well, I'd asked him one time
8	because, like, Father Charlie was always there; he was
9	always with Malcolm. I said, and I was joking but I said,
10	"Well, so which one's your boyfriend?" And he started to
11	laugh and he says that and I forget exactly right at
12	this second which one, but I believe it was Malcolm was his
13	partner. But I went "Oh, okay good time for me to go home
14	now".
15	MR. LEE: Was there any more conversation
16	about it than that, or was that the end of it?
17	MS. HESSE: No, that was definitely the end
18	of it. I didn't want to know any more.
19	MR. LEE: We have a lot of documents at this
20	Inquiry. One of them is Exhibit 715. It was just made an
21	exhibit today. It's your interview report with Steve
22	Seguin. Would you turn that up, please?
23	MS. HESSE: Yes.
24	MR. LEE: And this is the one that conducted
25	on April 21 st ,'98. You're living in the Northwest

1	refricories at the time and you told ve us today it s a
2	phone interview. Is that right?
3	MS. HESSE: Right.
4	MR. LEE: Would you go to the top of the
5	second page, the first and the third bullet:
6	"Seguin told her that he was Father
7	Charles' lover during a night of
8	drinking."
9	Do you recall telling the police that?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. LEE: Is that accurate? That's what Ken
12	Seguin told you?
13	MS. HESSE: Yeah, I couldn't remember just
14	now if it was Charlie or Malcolm because they were always
15	together.
16	MR. LEE: We're going to get to that.
17	The third bullet down is:
18	"Seguin told her that he and Malcolm
19	MacDonald were cuddly."
20	Is that accurate? Do you remember telling
21	the police that?
22	MS. HESSE: Yes.
23	MR. LEE: And can I assume "cuddly" is your
24	word and not Steve Seguin's?
25	MS. HESSE: Ken's you mean?

1	MR. LEE: Ken's word, that's the word he
2	used? Do you remember him specifically using that word?
3	MS. HESSE: At the time I thought he had
4	said cuddly, but then when I thought about it later. I
5	thought maybe he didn't use that particular word, I had,
6	that he had used another word.
7	MR. LEE: There I want to change topics.
8	You've talked to us today about seeing
9	Claude Shaver at Ken Seguin's house a couple of times?
10	MS. HESSE: Right.
11	MR. LEE: What I'm wondering is, is you've
12	told us all about how ken was going to the Commissioner
13	asked you about that. You leave. Your entry is Claude
14	Shaver and you leave. Is that right?
15	MS. HESSE: Right.
16	MR. LEE: You leave; Claude Shaver stays?
17	MS. HESSE: Right.
18	MR. LEE: Is there any discussion after that
19	time with Ken Seguin about why Claude Shaver was there?
20	MS. HESSE: No.
21	MR. LEE: You didn't ask him about it?
22	MS. HESSE: No.
23	MR. LEE: He didn't bring it up?
24	MS. HESSE: I just assumed it was work
25	related.

1	MR. LEE: And then you've told us that a
2	short time after during that same summer. Am I right?
3	MS. HESSE: Yes.
4	MR. LEE: You see him through the back door?
5	MS. HESSE: Right.
6	MR. LEE: Were you coming to Ken Seguin's
7	house that time?
8	MS. HESSE: Yes.
9	MR. LEE: Do you remember why?
10	MS. HESSE: Yeah, I was going to get my
11	brother?
12	MR. LEE: Gerry?
13	MS. HESSE: Gerry.
14	MR. LEE: He was living there at the time?
15	MS. HESSE: Yes.
16	MR. LEE: And so you come to the back door
17	and is Gerry there?
18	MS. HESSE: No. Ken met me at the back
19	door. I said, "Where's Gerry?" And he said, "Oh, he's
20	probably over at Cara's". I said, "Okay. Do you know what
21	time he left?" Because, like, I was supposed to meet him
22	at Ken's but he wasn't there.
23	MR. LEE: Did you wait for him?
24	MS. HESSE: No, I left and went to Cara's.
25	MR. LEE: You didn't go in the house at all?

1	MS. HESSE: No.
2	MR. LEE: And what about that time, was
3	there any discussion about why Claude Shaver was there?
4	MS. HESSE: No, I just assumed that again it
5	was work related.
6	MR. LEE: And there was no discussion after
7	the fact about why he was there?
8	MS. HESSE: No.
9	MR. LEE: Would you just give me one moment,
10	please.
11	Ms. Hesse, those are all my questions.
12	Thank you for coming.
13	MS. HESSE: Thank you.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Cipriano.
15	CROSS EXAMINATION BY/CONTRE-INTERROGATOIRE PAR MR.
16	CIPRIANO:
17	MR. CIPRIANO: Good afternoon, Ms. Hesse.
18	My name is Giuseppe Cipriano. I am one of the lawyers to
19	Father MacDonald.
20	I just have a few questions.
21	You've been talking a lot about your
22	brothers, and just for the record, your brothers are who?
23	MS. HESSE: There is Donald, Robert.
24	MR. CIPRIANO: Yes.
25	MS. HESSE: One that will remain nameless

1	and Gerald.
2	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. And I think you've
3	indicated to us that you are or you were a corrections
4	officer?
5	MS. HESSE: Yes.
6	MR. CIPRIANO: And did that bring you into
7	the inside of a prison at all?
8	MS. HESSE: Yeah.
9	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. And I'll get back to
10	that at a later point perhaps, but you've established that
11	you had either you yourself contacted Perry Dunlop or
12	Perry Dunlop contacted you in or about the summer or June
13	of 1996?
14	MS. HESSE: Correct.
15	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. And are you able to
16	tell us whether you know it was he who contacted you or
17	whether it was you who contacted
18	MS. HESSE: I still don't remember which
19	who contacted who.
20	MR. CIPRIANO: At any point, you learned
21	from that conversation that your brothers had been abused?
22	MS. HESSE: I assumed.
23	MR. CIPRIANO: You assumed? Okay.
24	MS. HESSE: And then Perry because when I
25	seen the pictures of the boys and knew why Perry was there;

1	he was doing an investigation on abuse
2	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay.
3	MS. HESSE: that had happened and when
4	he had pictures of my brothers, it was like an alarm went
5	off. It's like
6	MR. CIPRIANO: Did he tell you at all that
7	your brothers had alleged that they were victims of abuse?
8	MS. HESSE: No, he didn't tell me, I told
9	him.
10	MR. CIPRIANO: You told him that your
11	brothers
12	MS. HESSE: When I seen the pictures said,
13	"Oh, my God. My brother's a victim."
14	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. But you were making an
15	assumption at that point?
16	MS. HESSE: Yeah.
17	MR. CIPRIANO: Did you at all confirm or
18	attempt to confirm your assumption?
19	MS. HESSE: I asked the boys and at that
20	time they didn't want to talk about it. They didn't deny
21	it; they didn't say, "Yeah, it happened". They didn't
22	they just didn't talk to me about it, period.
23	MR. CIPRIANO: Can you tell us at what point
24	this is confirmed for you, that they were alleging abuse?
25	MS. HESSE: When they I guess I kind of

1	knew when Ken killed himself. But then it was confirmed, I
2	guess, when the charges were laid against the individuals.
3	MR. CIPRIANO: I think you told Mr. Stauffer
4	that Mr. Dunlop had indicated he was carrying out an
5	investigation?
6	MS. HESSE: Yes.
7	MR. CIPRIANO: Did he make this clear to
8	you?
9	MS. HESSE: Yes.
10	MR. CIPRIANO: Did you understand that your
11	statement that you provided was for the purposes of his
12	investigation?
13	MS. HESSE: I assumed.
14	MR. CIPRIANO: You indicated that since your
15	initial contact with Mr. Dunlop, you had come to have
16	further conversations with himself and his wife, Helen?
17	MS. HESSE: Yes.
18	MR. CIPRIANO: And this was several
19	conversations in between your initial meeting and
20	eventually giving your statement in December of 1996?
21	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, hold off now.
22	There was a statement in June of 1996.
23	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. I'm referring to the
24	December.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: So in between those two

MS. HESSE: Well, they're here. 24 MR. CIPRIANO: Okay, the handwritten

statement you're referring to is June 1, was question and

1	answer?
2	MS. HESSE: Yes.
3	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. When the charges were
4	eventually laid, did you have any communication with your
5	brothers?
6	MS. HESSE: Very limited.
7	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. Were you involved at
8	all in the process that they had gone through?
9	MS. HESSE: No.
10	MR. CIPRIANO: Other than who they were
11	alleging abuse from, did you know anything else about what
12	they were talking about?
13	MS. HESSE: I don't understand what you
14	mean.
15	MR. CIPRIANO: Were you aware of dates, for
16	instance, that they were alleging abuse?
17	MS. HESSE: No.
18	MR. CIPRIANO: I think you used the phrase
19	in one of your statements, the one that you gave to Mr.
20	Dunlop, that you would often see Father MacDonald at Ken's
21	and you would joke about him being part of the furniture?
22	MS. HESSE: Yes.
23	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. Who would you joke
24	about him with?
25	MS. HESSE: Ken, my brothers, people I hung

1	around with.
2	MR. CIPRIANO: Going back to what you said
3	earlier about your work as a Corrections Officer, would you
4	agree that, I guess, people who spend a significant amount
5	of time in custody get a bit hardened?
6	MS. HESSE: Somewhat, yes.
7	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
8	MR. CIPRIANO: And so I take it, because
9	your brothers never spoke to you about any of the details
10	other than who they were alleging the abuse from, you're
11	not aware as to whether any of the institutions would have
12	thought that perhaps your brother Robert's relationship
13	with Ken might have been consensual?
14	MS. HESSE: I'm not aware of anything.
15	Can you just rephrase that for a second?
16	How can a child consent?
17	MR. CIPRIANO: I'm just asking whether you
18	were aware?
19	MS. HESSE: No, I wasn't aware.
20	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
21	MR. CIPRIANO: Going back to that statement
22	about Father MacDonald being part of the furniture, did you
23	ever discuss that with your brother, Gerry?
24	MS. HESSE: Probably. I mean I talked about
25	it to anyone.

1	MR. CIPRIANO: Did you talk about that, or
2	did you use that phrase "part of the furniture" in relation
3	to anyone else?
4	MS. HESSE: No. I don't believe so.
5	MR. CIPRIANO: Did your brother, Gerry, use
6	that statement
7	MS. HESSE: No.
8	MR. CIPRIANO: in relation to anyone
9	else?
10	MS. HESSE: No.
11	MR. CIPRIANO: Okay. Thank you.
12	MS. HESSE: You're welcome.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Mr. Chisholm.
14	MR. CHISHOLM: Good afternoon, sir.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Good afternoon.
16	MR. CHISHOLM: Good afternoon, Ms. Hesse.
17	My name is Peter Chisholm. I am counsel for the local CAS.
18	I have no questions for you. Thank you.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Messrs. Rose
20	or Rouleau?
21	CROSS-EXAMINATION BY/CONTRE-INTERROGATOIRE PAR MR.
22	ROSE:
23	MR. ROSE: Good afternoon, Mrs. Hesse. My
24	name is David Rose. I am a lawyer for the Ministry of
25	Community Safety and Correctional Services. I just have a

1	few questions for you.
2	Ma'am, you've talked today about your
3	brothers and I am just curious about sort of how involved
4	you would have been in your brothers' lives during, for
5	instance, the 1980's.
6	Let's take your brother, Gerry, for
7	instance. Were you aware, for instance, about the types of
8	jobs that Gerry had in the 1980s?
9	MS. HESSE: Mostly, yes.
10	MR. ROSE: Okay.
11	MS. HESSE: I actually obtained custody of
12	the three minor boys prior to my dad's death. So like we
13	were very close at one time. So, yeah, I know what
14	construction jobs and farming jobs that Gerry had.
15	MR. ROSE: Okay. And so would you have been
16	aware as well about the types of charges that Gerry would
17	acquire through the 1980s?
18	MS. HESSE: Most of them, yes.
19	MR. ROSE: Okay. And for that matter, as
20	well, when Gerry had relationships with women, girls,
21	things like that, you'd be aware of who was involved in his
22	life?
23	MS. HESSE: Right.
24	MR. ROSE: So I think you mentioned today
25	being told that Gerry was at Cara's?

1	MS. HESSE: Right.
2	MR. ROSE: And you were aware, for instance,
3	that when Gerry was living at Ken Seguin's house, he had
4	this girlfriend, Cara?
5	MS. HESSE: Cara and Gerry were common-law
6	at one time. They have a child together.
7	MR. ROSE: Okay.
8	MS. HESSE: They had some problems. Gerry
9	went to stay at Ken's.
10	MR. ROSE: So in other words, you're aware
11	during its time, during the life of their relationship,
12	that Gerry had this relationship with Cara?
13	MS. HESSE: Yes.
14	MR. ROSE: And that coincided, it was the
15	same time that Gerry was living at Ken Seguin's?
16	MS. HESSE: Well, they were having Cara
17	and Gerry were having problems at that time, yes, and Gerry
18	had moved out of their home
19	MR. ROSE: And he had had problems, but it
20	was in the course of an ongoing relationship?
21	MS. HESSE: Yes.
22	MR. ROSE: Okay. And changing a bit and
23	asking about Ken Seguin, I get the sense from your
24	testimony, ma'am, that you considered yourself a good
25	friend of Ken Seguin?

1	MS. HESSE: I did.
2	MR. ROSE: And as you talked about, you had
3	visited him at his residence in Riverdale?
4	MS. HESSE: Once.
5	MR. ROSE: Summerstown?
6	MS. HESSE: Lots.
7	MR. ROSE: Lots. You'd go for coffee with
8	him. You'd have lunch with him, and you were a confidante
9	of Ken Seguin. In other words, he'd tell you fairly deeply
10	personal details about himself, wouldn't he?
11	MS. HESSE: Yes.
12	MR. ROSE: In fact, about his sexuality?
13	MS. HESSE: Yes.
14	MR. ROSE: Now, in terms of Summerstown,
15	you've talked as well about seeing your brothers at that
16	place?
17	MS. HESSE: Yes.
18	MR. ROSE: And I take it that it was only
19	when you met Perry Dunlop for the first time that you first
20	came to know that there was abuse going on between Ken
21	Seguin and your brothers?
22	MS. HESSE: Yes.
23	MR. ROSE: I think your evidence today was
24	that you had no idea about abuse until that day?
25	MS. HESSE: Exactly.

1	MR. ROSE: Okay.
2	MS. HESSE: And at that time, I didn't
3	realize that it was all of the boys.
4	MR. ROSE: Right. And just to go back to
5	that moment when I think you said it was a reality check or
6	I think that was the phrase you used?
7	MS. HESSE: M'hm.
8	MR. ROSE: That was the moment when you're
9	meeting Perry Dunlop, wasn't it?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. ROSE: And I think again when you were
12	being cross-examined this afternoon, you said that you had
13	assumed that this was what was going on because of the
14	nature of the contact between yourself and Perry, Perry
15	Dunlop. In other words, he's there investigating
16	allegations
17	MS. HESSE: Yes.
18	MR. ROSE: of sexual abuse. You assumed
19	because he was showing you pictures of your brother that
20	your brothers had been abused by Ken Seguin?
21	MS. HESSE: Yes.
22	MR. ROSE: Have I got that right?
23	MS. HESSE: Yes.
24	MR. ROSE: Okay. So you didn't really have
25	hard evidence until that time?

1	MC UPCCE. No
1	MS. HESSE: No.
2	MR. ROSE: Okay. And that's to say, ma'am,
3	that the sense that Ken Seguin was abusing your brothers
4	shocked you. Would that be fair to say? It would have
5	been
6	MS. HESSE: Shock would be very mild.
7	MR. ROSE: Right. It's a in some sense,
8	as a sister, it's a traumatic event to learn that, isn't
9	it?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. ROSE: At any time.
12	MS. HESSE: And to think it was someone that
13	I trusted.
14	MR. ROSE: Right. And would it be fair to
15	say then, ma'am, that you certainly didn't know that while
16	you were visiting your brothers at Ken Seguin's house, did
17	you?
18	MS. HESSE: No.
19	MR. ROSE: And that's again to say that you
20	had no idea that this was going on while you're visiting
21	your brothers at Ken Seguin's house?
22	MS. HESSE: No.
23	MR. ROSE: Okay. And would it also be fair
24	to say, ma'am, that you knew that Ken was a homosexual of
25	that inclination during the time that your brothers were

1	living at his house?
2	MS. HESSE: My brother.
3	MR. ROSE: I'm sorry.
4	MS. HESSE: Yes.
5	MR. ROSE: Correct. While Gerry was living
6	there?
7	MS. HESSE: Yes.
8	MR. ROSE: Okay. So, in other words, you
9	knew that Ken was homosexual while Gerry was living there?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. ROSE: Okay. And you, I take it, would
12	have appreciated that being homosexual is not the same as
13	abusing young boys. It's two different things
14	MS. HESSE: No, I assumed like Ken
15	treated the boys like a big brother. So I just assumed he
16	was still the big brother. He was going to keep them on
17	the straight and narrow. And I mean Ken did do a lot of
18	good things for a lot of people, and if you'd have told me
19	a week before Ken committed suicide that Ken had done this,
20	I'd have probably cracked you and then told you you were a
21	liar.
22	MR. ROSE: Right. And I'm not saying this
23	in a critical way, ma'am. I'm just trying to understand
24	we're all trying to understand what was going on at Ken
25	Seguin's house during this time period, and that's to say

1	Hesse. I'm David Sherriff-Scott. I act for the Diocese.
2	I have no questions for you. Thank you.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
4	Mr. Manderville?
5	CROSS-EXAMINATION BY/CONTRE-INTERROGATOIRE PAR MR.
6	MANDERVILLE:
7	MR. MANDERVILLE: Thank you, Mr.
8	Commissioner. Good afternoon.
9	Good afternoon, Ms. Hesse.
10	MS. HESSE: Good afternoon.
11	MR. MANDERVILLE: My name is Peter
12	Manderville. I am counsel for the Cornwall Police in this
13	Inquiry and I have a handful of questions for you.
14	I want to clear up one, no doubt,
15	misunderstanding on my part. You testified a little
16	earlier that you were a were you a Corrections Officer
17	in the Northwest Territories?
18	MS. HESSE: I was actually hired as
19	Cook/Correctional Officer.
20	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. Then that is my
21	misunderstanding because I'm looking at your interview with
22	the OPP or their typewritten version of it and the
23	handwritten version as well, and they both describe you as
24	a self-employed cook. So I was a little confused about

1	MS. HESSE: No.
2	MR. MANDERVILLE: Was there a period of time
3	where you were not a Corrections Officer and were working
4	as a cook until such time as you became one?
5	MS. HESSE: Actually, I took a leave of
6	absence. I did it every year, from Corrections, and to
7	come home to visit family and then when I go back, I'd let
8	them know when I wanted to go back to work. It was a great
9	set-up for me and if I felt like trying something else for
10	a period of time, I could, and then I did for a brief time.
11	I did cakes for different functions and so therefore, I was
12	self-employed in spurts and
13	MR. MANDERVILLE: Fits and starts?
14	MS. HESSE: Yes.
15	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. Now, you told us
16	earlier that you had been to Mr. Seguin's house in
17	Summerstown quite often. Is that fair?
18	MS. HESSE: Yes.
19	MR. MANDERVILLE: And that would have been
20	in the latter part of the 1980s, and were you there very
21	often after Gerry moved out?
22	MS. HESSE: Some, but not a lot.
23	MR. MANDERVILLE: Certainly not to the
24	out ant you were when he was living there?
	extent you were when he was living there?

1	MR. MANDERVILLE: Sorry. That's correct?
2	MS. HESSE: That's correct.
3	MR. MANDERVILLE: And I take it despite
4	attending there on numerous occasions, you never observed
5	any sexual activity at all on the occasions you were there,
6	did you?
7	MS. HESSE: No.
8	MR. MANDERVILLE: And you told us that until
9	you met with Mr. Dunlop in 1996 that you had no inkling
10	whatever that there was an allegation of sexual abuse or
11	sexual assaults involving Mr. Seguin, did you?
12	MS. HESSE: No.
13	MR. MANDERVILLE: You did know that your
14	brother, Gerry, was living with a man you knew to be
15	homosexual for a period of a year and a bit at a time when
16	Gerry was 23-24 years old?
17	MS. HESSE: Yes. I'm not sure how old Gerry
18	was. I don't remember his age at that time, but it
19	wouldn't have been any different than Gerry living with one
20	of my other siblings.
21	MR. MANDERVILLE: Or any other friend of
22	yours, right?
23	MS. HESSE: Exactly.
24	MR. MANDERVILLE: Because you considered Ken
25	to be a friend at that time?

1	MS. HESSE: Yes.
2	MR. MANDERVILLE: And just to help you,
3	Gerry has told us that he lived with Mr. Seguin from
4	February 1989 to some point in 1990, and we know Gerry was
5	born in December '65. So that would have made him 23-24,
6	wouldn't it?
7	MS. HESSE: Yes.
8	MR. MANDERVILLE: Now, you talked a little
9	bit about the photographs Mr. Dunlop showed you when you
10	met with him. Would I be correct in presuming that the
11	photographs depicted nothing more than either individuals
12	or groups of people sitting around in Mr. Seguin's living
13	room or on his porch?
14	MS. HESSE: In his boat, in his backyard,
15	yes.
16	MR. MANDERVILLE: Certainly nothing untoward
17	as just people sitting around smiling for the camera?
18	MS. HESSE: Basically, yes.
19	MR. MANDERVILLE: Maybe raising a beer
20	bottle?
21	MS. HESSE: A few.
22	MR. MANDERVILLE: So the photos themselves
23	wouldn't have given you any cause for concern, would they?
24	MS. HESSE: No.
25	MR. MANDERVILLE: It was more about what Mr.

1	Dunlop was suggesting he was investigating; correct?
2	MS. HESSE: Not suggesting. It was that
3	Perry had told me that he was investigating the abuse.
4	MR. MANDERVILLE: So it was rather more
5	stark than I just told you. He told you flat out, "Here's
6	what I'm investigating". It wasn't a suggestion at all?
7	MS. HESSE: No.
8	MR. MANDERVILLE: I'm correct?
9	MS. HESSE: Not in the way you're saying it
10	perhaps.
11	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. Give me your words
12	for it.
13	MS. HESSE: When Perry and I talked, he said
14	that he was investigating allegations of child abuse in the
15	area and that I might know someone or some of the people
16	that were in these photos.
17	MR. MANDERVILLE: And then he showed you
18	pictures which included your brother Gerry?
19	MS. HESSE: And Bob.
20	MR. MANDERVILLE: And your brother Robert as
21	well, which as you mentioned was disconcerting to say the
22	least.
23	MS. HESSE: Yes.
24	MR. MANDERVILLE: Now, I understand that
25	Perry and his wife, Helen, were rather helpful to Gerry and

1	to Robert.
2	MS. HESSE: Yes, to all of us.
3	MR. MANDERVILLE: To all four of your
4	brothers?
5	MS. HESSE: And myself.
6	MR. MANDERVILLE: And Perry and Helen
7	assisted Gerry in getting a job out in British Columbia?
8	MS. HESSE: That's my understanding.
9	MR. MANDERVILLE: With Helen's brother?
10	MS. HESSE: Yes.
11	MR. MANDERVILLE: I'd like to take a look,
12	Ms. Hesse, at Exhibit 716 with you and that, Madam
13	Registrar, is Document 728950.
14	It's the question and answer session you had
15	with Mr. Dunlop dated June 24, 1996?
16	MS. HESSE: Yes.
17	MR. MANDERVILLE: I suspect it's on your
18	screen but do you also have a hard copy in front of you?
19	MS. HESSE: Yes, I do.
20	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. You told us a
21	little earlier in your description of your first encounter
22	with Mr. Shaver that you recall I'm sorry, do you recall
23	that quite distinctly?
24	MS. HESSE: Yes, I do.
25	MR. MANDERVILLE: And you recall that you

1	were leaving and then he pulled in and he had to move his
2	car for you to get out; correct?
3	MS. HESSE: Correct.
4	MR. MANDERVILLE: And I'd ask you to look at
5	page 2 of that question and answer statement and the first
6	answer, or signified with an "A" you give there, I'm going
7	to suggest to you described the situation completely in the
8	reverse. Is that fair?
9	MS. HESSE: Pardon?
10	MR. MANDERVILLE: I'm going to suggest to
11	you that in this statement, you describe your encounter
12	with Mr. Shaver completely in the reverse of how you
13	described it here today.
14	MS. HESSE: No, I don't believe that to be
15	true.
16	MR. MANDERVILLE: You see that statement
17	there:
18	"One time when I got there, Malcolm and
19	Shaver were just leaving and I had to
20	pull out so they could get out."
21	MS. HESSE: Yes.
22	MR. MANDERVILLE: And isn't that the reverse
23	of what you told us today?
24	MS. HESSE: But I believe this to be the
25	other time that Claude was there.

1	MR. MANDERVILLE: So this is another time?
2	MS. HESSE: There was twice I met Mr. Shaver
3	at Ken's.
4	MR. MANDERVILLE: Once through a doorway.
5	MS. HESSE: Yes.
6	MR. MANDERVILLE: Which you don't mention in
7	any of these statements; correct?
8	MS. HESSE: I don't know. I didn't read the
9	statements fully. I don't remember if they're in the
10	statement or not.
11	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. Well, I've read
12	your statements quite closely and until we saw an
13	anticipated evidence or what your anticipated evidence
14	would be today, there was no mention of the time you saw
15	Mr. Shaver through a doorway.
16	Do you accept what I'm telling you?
17	MS. HESSE: No.
18	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. Do you want to read
19	your OPP statement and read the Q and A, question and
20	answer session, because I'm happy to go through it with
21	you?
22	MS. HESSE: What part of the OPP statement
23	do you want me to read?
24	MR. MANDERVILLE: I guess it would begin at
25	page 3 of the statement. It has a number 288 at the top.

1	Do you see the heading, "Statement of Carole Deschamps
2	dated 13 December '96"?
3	MS. HESSE: Yeah.
4	MR. MANDERVILLE: The third paragraph:
5	"I remember one particular time when I
6	went to Ken's home in Summerstown, I
7	observed Claude Shaver and Malcolm
8	MacDonald visiting at Ken's. The two
9	of them were in the process of leaving
10	and I had to move my car so they could
11	get out. The time I saw Claude Shaver
12	and Malcolm MacDonald would have been
13	when Ken first bought the place in
14	Summerstown."
15	Do you see that?
16	MS. HESSE: Yeah.
17	MR. MANDERVILLE: I suggested to you moments
18	ago that that was the reverse of what you described earlier
19	today, isn't it?
20	MS. HESSE: Yes. Well, this just says that
21	at one particular time I had met Claude at Ken's. It
22	doesn't say it was the first time.
23	MR. MANDERVILLE: Well, you told us a little
24	earlier that you felt you might have seen Mr. Shaver at
25	Ken's house on two separate occasions; correct?

1	MS. HESSE: Correct.
2	MR. MANDERVILLE: On one occasion where you
3	were fairly certain that he pulled in behind you as you
4	were leaving?
5	MS. HESSE: Yes.
6	MR. MANDERVILLE: And he had to move his car
7	for you to get out; correct?
8	MS. HESSE: Correct.
9	MR. MANDERVILLE: And the second time where
10	you saw him through a doorway.
11	MS. HESSE: Yes.
12	MR. MANDERVILLE: And Ken came to the door
13	and told you Gerry wasn't home or wasn't there; correct?
14	MS. HESSE: Correct.
15	MR. MANDERVILLE: And there were no cars
16	moving on that occasion were there?
17	MS. HESSE: I don't remember now.
18	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. And I take it there
19	was not a third occasion you can recall?
20	MS. HESSE: Not that I remember.
21	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. So what I'm
22	suggesting to you is that the occasion you described for us
23	earlier is actually the reverse of how you describe it here
24	in these statements. Am I right?
25	MS. HESSE: I guess it would be fair to

1	assume that it's backwards, yes.
2	MR. MANDERVILLE: Oh, we're not just
3	assuming it. It is isn't it?
4	MS. HESSE: I don't remember if I was
5	leaving or if reading this, it looks like I blocked them
6	in. Looking back, I thought he had blocked me in when I
7	first met Claude.
8	MR. MANDERVILLE: Okay. And we're talking
9	about a long time ago aren't we?
10	MS. HESSE: A very long time ago.
11	MR. MANDERVILLE: And you felt it had
12	happened at least in the statement we just looked at
13	you felt it had happened very soon after Ken bought the
14	place in Summerstown, and we know he bought it in May 1986.
15	So it's 21 years ago now isn't it?
16	MS. HESSE: Yeah.
17	MR. MANDERVILLE: Now, Mr. Shaver just so
18	you know, Ms. Hesse, Mr. Shaver denies knowing who Ken
19	Seguin was and denies ever being at his house. I take it
20	you disagree with that?
21	MS. HESSE: He's lying.
22	MR. MANDERVILLE: Well, he would say that
23	you are, ma'am, or that at the very least you're mistaken.
24	And it was a long time ago wasn't it?
25	MS. HESSE: It was a long time ago, but it

1	stuck in my mind why the Chief of Police would be at Ken
2	Seguin's. I assumed and at that time, I was very naïve.
3	I didn't know how the justice system worked.
4	So I assumed because Malcolm and Ken had
5	seen each other quite often that it was about clients or
6	young offenders or whatever, and I assumed that's why the
7	Chief of Police was there. He is the one that charges
8	them, then he sends them to court. The judge gives them to
9	a lawyer. A lawyer gives them to the Probation Officer. I
10	just assumed that's the way it worked. So I thought it was
11	all very innocent and Mr. Shaver was there doing part of
12	his duties.
13	MR. MANDERVILLE: And, in fact, Ms. Hesse,
14	you have no evidence at all to suggest otherwise do you?
15	MS. HESSE: No.
16	MR. MANDERVILLE: Thank you very much.
17	MS. HESSE: You're welcome.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Mr. Kozloff?
19	MR. KOZLOFF: Good afternoon, Mr.
20	Commissioner.
21	THE COMMISSIONER: Good afternoon.
22	MR. KOZLOFF: Good afternoon, Mrs. Hesse.
23	My name is Neil Kozloff. I represent the Ontario
24	Provincial Police. I have no questions. Thank you.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Mr. Carroll?

1	MR. CARROLL: Good afternoon. My name is
2	Bill Carroll. I represent the Ontario Provincial Police
3	Association, and I have no questions for you this
4	afternoon. Thank you.
5	MS. HESSE: Thank you.
6	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. So that does
7	it. I think that's everybody.
8	MR. STAUFFER: So Mr. Commissioner, I have
9	no further questions for Ms. Hesse. Thank you, ma'am.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Ms. Hesse, thank you very
11	much for your assistance here today. Those are all the
12	questions we have so you are free to go if you wish.
13	MS. HESSE: Thank you.
14	MR. STAUFFER: Thank you. So Mr.
15	Commissioner, in terms of the game plan for the balance of
16	the week, there will be no hearing tomorrow, but there will
17	be an all-counsel meeting, as I understand it.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Right.
19	MR. STAUFFER: And then it is our
20	expectation that Mr. Charles Bourgeois will be here for the
21	Wednesday and possibly the Thursday of this week.
22	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. So we adjourn
23	until Wednesday at 10:00 at 9:30, sorry.
24	MR. STAUFFER: Until Wednesday at 9:30, sir.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

1	MR. STAUFFER: There is one other matter in
2	terms of perhaps, Mr. Commissioner, you can give me some
3	guidance here. We have yet to enter one of the monikers
4	formally into the transcript.
5	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
6	MR. STAUFFER: And so we will need to go
7	into an in camera session. It won't require anybody's
8	attendance here except yourself, but I think we need to
9	have that cleaned up.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. So why don't
11	we do that in 15 minutes.
12	The rest of you are free to go, of course,
13	unless you want to witness the putting in of the moniker,
14	which of course you are quite welcome.
15	In any event, we will resume in 15 minutes
16	for that purpose.
17	Thank you.
18	THE REGISTRAR: Order. All rise. À
