Jodoin steps down

United Way accepts offer for leave of absence, with pay

More than two weeks after he was charged with sexual assault under Project Truth, Keith Jodoin has taken a leave of absence with pay from his position as executive director of the United Way of Cornwall and District.

United Way's president Kazi Marouf told a news conference Monday the board accepted the executive director's offer pending resolution of the criminal charge against him.

Jodoin, 70, of Island 17 in Long Sault, was charged Aug. 24 with the sexual assault of a 21-year-old.

The charge dates back 15 years to when Jodoin was justice of the peace and court administrator in Cornwall.

Jodoin is scheduled to appear in

court Sept. 18, five days after the local United Way kicks off its year 2000 fundraising campaign to raise \$560,000 to help 19 community oriented agencies.

Marouf said Jodoin will continue in a "helpful role" and assist as required with the organization.

"The United Way and Mr. Jodoin look forward to him resuming his duties as soon as possible," Marouf emphasized.

Jodoin was not at the news conference.

Marouf declined to release Jodoin's precise salary. He would only say Jodoin makes between \$20,000 and \$40,000.

Meanwhile, Andre Rivette, a city councillor, has been appointed acting executive director of the United Way and has already assumed his new position.

Marouf said the United Way has made a "separate arrangement" with Rivette, who will be paid for his new role. He would also not say how much Rivette will be paid.

Rivette has been relieved of his responsibilities as vice president during this period. Jim Cicchini, a board member, will assume the role of acting vice president.

Marouf said the United Way budget will be able to handle the increased payroll.

"This will not be a big burden," he

said.

Marouf said Jodoin, in a letter to the board, offered to take the leave of absence with pay.

"The board debated for a while and agreed to the offer," Marouf said.

Asked what happens if Jodoin's case drags on for a long time, the president said they will cross the hurdle when the time comes.

"We are hoping it would not take too long before this matter is resolved."

Less than a week after the executive director was charged, the United Way board unanimously asked Jodoin to stay on.

The board said then Jodoin's status would be re-evaluated after his trial.

The United Way officially kicked off its fundraising campaign Wednesday at the breakfast sponsored by the Standard-Freeholder.
